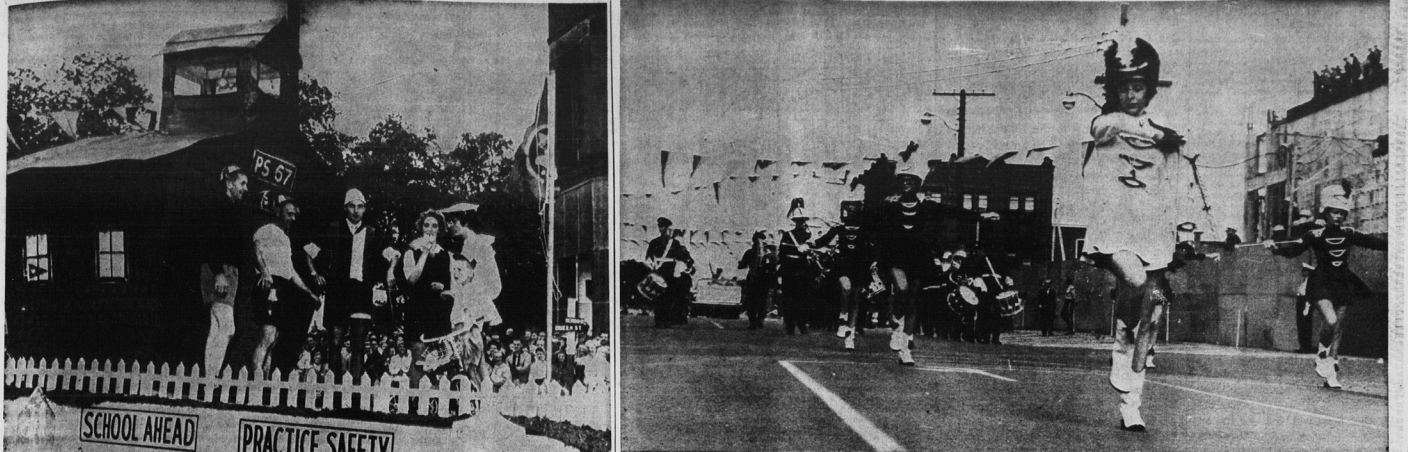


Thousands Flock To Charlottetown To See Spectacle Of Gold Cup And Saucer Parade

City Streets Jammed For Big Parade Event

The most colorful event in the program of Old Home Week and the entertainment highlight in the City for the summer season—the Gold Cup and Saucer Parade—scored a smash hit yesterday.

Thousands of visitors rubbed shoulders with urban and rural residents of the province as they crisscrossed the city streets along the thickly packed parade route. There was something for everyone. Kiddies thrilled to the clowns and ponies, teen-agers gaped at the display of festive picnicians, and the older and more sophisticated applauded the marching detachments and gaily decorated floats. The bands, everyone said, was hard to estimate the size of the crowd this year. There were just as many, maybe a few more, standing as last year, but the big difference was in the far greater number of cars packed all over the town. It was impossible to control parking as so many cars streamed into the city streets to park where there was no place to park and no way to get out of town.

TREMENDOUS THROG
One business man said he never before saw such a tremendous throng of people near his establishment—and that was not one of the uptown buildings.

The Island's famous camping grounds and trailer parks were crowded with people who drove in for the parade of which they had heard so much. From the farms and the fishing banks, from business offices and mercantile banks, doctors, lawyers and Indian Chiefs, everybody was here.

Never before was this city the focal point of so much concentrated interest and the enthusiasm of the spectators was only equalled by their patience. There is an unusual quality in children who attend to many of them. It was this morning was the finest compliment the parade will ever receive.

Councils Not Happy In Housing Site Study

The Summerside Town Council is reported not happy over the recent announcement that Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation is considering three sites in the area for an additional 175 housing units for RCAF personnel.

Two of the sites are situated nearby St. Eleanor's, and the third is the municipal airport property directly north of the Elm Street school, which belongs to the town.

ONLY ADEQUATE SITE
The council feels that the airport property is the only adequate site for the project, a number of town spokesmen said. The council is holding out for the entire 175 units. A portion of this area is already served by underground requirements and power.
