Now it is different." Although he described the competition as rough, he believes that horse racing has reached such a near-perfect point, that it won't get any tougher in the future.
"Hoodey's" meal ticket at the present time is a seven-year-old victor, Mac, that he sired \$4,975 with last season, and he has already this year been in the winner's circle four times. He believes Victory Mac will take a slice off the record of 2:04 3-5, he made in 1956. He has a two-year-old, and for that reason turned down an offer of \$5,000 for her.
