Barbituates, Alcohol Blamed In Jail Death

SUMMERSIDE - A coroner's jury last evening found that the death of a young man took one or two of these pills a day.

Upon questioning by Prince County coroner, Dr. Marvin Clark of Kensington, Dr. Kennedy said the minimum lethal dose of these pills is 30 grams. Each pill contains 15 grams and after the deceased had been taken into custody by Dr. Foley in Tignish some 15 pills remained from what was reported to be the 34 obtained earlier on the day of Hogan's death. This would make for a dose of 16 1/2 grams.

The jury, consisting of John Schurman, foreman; E. A. Hayes, John Walker, Arnold Johnson, C. L. du Harkness, Windsor Foley, Miss Alma Basile and Dr. Roy Kennedy, MD, of Tignish.

Testimony given by Dr. Kennedy stated that the deceased had obtained 29 seasonal pills from the doctor's office on the day of his death.

Dr. Kennedy said that the deceased had been obtaining the same amount of these pills "a barbituate," every 12 or 14 days and said this procedure had been going on since he had opened practice in Tignish some 18 months ago.

Dr. Kennedy termed the deceased a chronic alcoholic and said a high strung and nervous man.
