UNITED STATES AND SPAIN.
 A Complete Change of Conditions.
 Spain Caves in and will Make Concessions.

ARMISTICE TO BE PROCLAIMED IN CUBA.
 Cuban Independence Assured.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Swift as a cannon's flash has changed the Cuban situation. Yesterday afternoon the galleries of Congress were crowded, while Senators and Representatives were anxious and agitated with the excitement. At the highest point, word passed around that there would be no message. The suddenness of this announcement stirred the public for a time. Ultimately it became known that not only would there be no message this week but that it was a possibility that the message written and approved might never go to Congress at all.

The first reason for delay was that the administration had received advices from General Lee at Havana indicating that all the Americans could not be gotten off the island yesterday and would be in grave peril if the message preceded their departure.

The second reason was that Spain has decided to open the case closed as far as this government is concerned by the refusal of Spain to make a satisfactory response to the representation made by the United States last week, and in order to avert impending war had decided to make concessions heretofore refused.

It is said that Spain will at once proclaim an armistice in Cuba, and that, eventually, Cuban independence will be declared. The details have yet to be worked out.

The giving away on the part of Spain was the result of pressure from the European powers.

The war scare, which was greatly exaggerated and much of it manufactured out of the whole cloth, is about collapsed, and business is assuming a healthier tone.

FIRE IN HALIFAX.
 Four Hundred out of Employment.

HALIFAX, April 7.—A fire in the cotton factory here yesterday did much damage, and four hundred employees have been thrown out of work for a time.

Death of a Laborer.
 HALIFAX, April 7.—A laborer named Albert Kearling was killed at Rockingham, four miles from here, yesterday, by a fall of earth and stone.

NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

New York, April 6.—Antoine Variele, of the French Geological Society, arrived on the French steamship La Bretagne yesterday, with a balloon, with which he intends to make the trip from Juneau to the Klondike. There are about a dozen persons in the party, and they are all at the Hotel Martin. The balloon will carry about 7,300 pounds. The members of the expedition are stopping here only until news comes from Juneau that the apparatus is ready for generating the hydrogen with which the balloon is to be inflated. When that is ready the party will go directly to Juneau, and if the wind is favorable the trip to the Klondike will be made at once. The cost of the expedition is borne partly by the French geographical society and partly by the members of the party.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 6.—Notwithstanding war alarms, the steamer Ravensdale sailed for Havana yesterday with 8,491 barrels of potatoes and 1,530 drums of dry fish. The net price paid to the farmers of King's County, N. S., and of New Brunswick was fifty cents per bushel, making over \$11,000.

MADRID, April 6.—Two companies of artillery and two battalions of chasseurs sailed for the Canaries yesterday. The crew of the French training ship Iphigenie cheered the departing troops, who, with crowds on the quays, warmly reciprocated, making a Franco-Spanish demonstration.

WINNIPEG, April 6.—Arthur Braden, of the royal engineer's depot, Chatham, England, passed through Winnipeg yesterday to join the staff now engaged on the fortifications at Esquimault, British Columbia. He says all the ships of the British navy are being got ready for active service in anticipation of trouble over the eastern question. Engineer Braden will have charge of the mechanical work at Esquimault.

World's Gold Production in 1897.

The Director of the United States Mint, from information now in his possession, states that there is substantial evidence that the world's output of gold for the calendar year 1897 will approximate, if it does not exceed, \$240,000,000 in value, an increase of close to twenty per cent over 1896. Of this total the United States produced approximately \$61,500,000, an increase of \$8,400,000 over 1896; Africa, \$58,000,000, an increase of \$13,600,000; Australia, \$51,900,000, an increase of \$6,800,000; Mexico, \$10,900,000 an increase of \$1,700,000; Canada, \$7,500,000, an increase of \$4,700,000; India, \$7,500,000, an increase of \$1,400,000; Russia, \$25,000,000, an increase of \$3,500,000.

The indications for the United States, says Director Preston, are that Colorado will lead in the production of gold for 1897, as it is estimated by former Governor Grant that it will not be less than \$20,000,000. California will follow with a product of probably \$19,000,000. With the exception of the States of the South Appalachian range, he believes that there will be an increase in every producing State and Territory of the gold products over that of 1896.
