Local and Other Items.

OLD WOMAN GONE.—The death of Mrs. Lucy Alexander took place at Keokuk, Iowa, last week, at the ripe age of 127 years. She was the oldest person in Iowa. She was born near Richmond, Va., in December, 1770, and had lived in Iowa for forty-two years. It is said she left records proving her age.

WANT HOME MADE SHOES.—The enterprising people of Bridgetown, N. S., are agitating for a shoe factory in their progressive town, with a capital of \$10,000 divided in 200 shares of \$50 each. Less than two thirds of that amount is required to put the factory in operation and one quarter of the necessary amount has been guaranteed from outside. It is only a question of time when it will be in successful operation.

A BRAVE MOTHER.—Mrs. Downs of Parry Sound, Ont., a mother of Spartan fortitude. She was sleeping in bed with her twelve-hour-old babe when a fire in her own room awoke her. The flames were creeping up the wall near her bed. She jumped out of the bed, picked up her new-born babe and rushed out into a blinding snow-storm with nothing around her but a quilt, which she picked up with the baby. She was assisted to a neighbor's house, and will probably recover.

A NEW OATH.—The customs department at Ottawa, through an order-in-council, has changed the forms of the oaths and declarations required from importers on entering goods. Under the present form of oath they have to swear that the invoice exhibits the fair market value of the goods when sold for home consumption in the country whence exported, which is the standard of value for duty purposes in Canada, while in very many cases the invoices are based upon special export prices, and do not represent fair market value.

THE KAISER'S ROUTE.—An ordinary traveller may change his mind and nothing is inferred from his deviations. But with a king it is a different matter. The Kaiser will not come home by way of Berlin and Vienna, from which the quid nuncs suspect two things—that His Majesty is displeased with Berlin for abandoning her projected festival reception, and that the relations between Germany and Austria are less friendly than they have been. The authorities at Potsdam are preparing to give the Emperor and Empress a brilliant welcome home.

TO ESCAPE THE KNIFE.—Prisoners in France seem to have a curious habit of shuffling of this mortal coil in their cells. There was Col. Henry, for instance. It was a razor that did his business. Now it is Liut. Gourko, who was under arrest for an attempt to murder one of the Russian state secretaries at Monte Carlo, and was awaiting extradition. His brother visited him and shortly afterwards a violent sickness seized him. He was found dead in his cell. The lieutenant was the son of Count Joseph Gourko, one of the most distinguished generals of the Russo-Turkish war.

THE SENTIMENTAL BURGLAR.—Three weeks ago a burglar was committed in Chicago. The housebreaker was discovered before he had made his escape, and in the struggle which followed a little miniature which he wore was torn from his vest. It was found upon the floor, and when the police came it was given to them. It was the portrait—painted on glass and framed in a little gold circle—of a pretty young girl. The police drew the conclusion that it was the burglar's sweetheart. They were right. And because of this miniature the man who lost it was arrested in St. Louis, his picture was sent to Chicago, and was identified as the burglar who lost the miniature.—New York Journal.

REMARKABLE ICE BREAKER.—According to a late despatch from London the Armstrong ship building yard has just lost a vessel of a remarkable type, and designed for a remarkable purpose. She looked like a battle ship, except that her bow forms an exceedingly long overhang. She is called an ice breaker and will be used to keep open the routes which depend upon the Baltic ports, thus providing employment for the large number who have hitherto had to remain idle during the time that harbours are closed. The vessel was built for the Russian government, and is the largest ice breaker in the world. Her length is 305 feet, breadth 71 feet, and depth 42 feet. She has four propellers, each driven by a separate set of machinery, with a combined horse power of 10,000.
