

In Memoriam

JOHN T. CAIRNS

During the early morning hours of March 10th, the Angel of Death, hovered low over the community of Maple Plains and carried to its immortal home the soul of John Thomas Cairns.

John, as he was familiarly known to young and old alike, was born in Newton 63 years ago as a son of the late Elizabeth Hughes and Terrence Cairns.

At an early age he went to the United States where he was employed as conductor on the street cars of the Boston Elevated Railway until the outbreak of World War One, when he enlisted in the American Army, and saw action in France. At the close of the war he returned to his former job. During a vacation to his native Prince Edward Island, he bought a farm in Maple Plains to which he returned the following year with his bride the former Mary Spencer of Cork, Ireland, and where he farmed actively until a few years ago.

Although in failing health for the past ten years, he was never known to complain, but bore his cross with Christian fortitude and was up and about as usual until a week before his death, at which time it was known that medical skill was of no avail, and the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church were administered to him by his beloved pastor, Rev. Harold Croken. A few days later, while his family knelt in prayer by his bedside, his soul peacefully winged its way heavenward.

A fond and loving husband and father, a devout Catholic, a loyal friend, and a good neighbor, is the finest tribute to be paid to any man, and all these can be truly said of John Cairns.

Besides his sorrowing wife he leaves to mourn, one son, Louis, at home, and four daughters, Marion, who tenderly cared for him during his last illness, Louise (Mrs. Layton Noonan) Albany, Frances, teaching in Albany Village School, and Phyllis teaching in Lady Fane. Three grandchildren also survive, Ivan, Ferne, and Audrey Noonan.

The funeral, which was under the direction of P. A. Monaghan, was largely attended despite poor travelling conditions. It was held from his late residence on Saturday morning at 8.45 to St. Malachy's Church, Kinkora, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Harold Croken at the grave in the adjoining cemetery, where all that was mortal of a wonderful husband and father, was laid to rest.

Present in the sanctuary were Rev. Reginald MacDonald and Rev. Preston Hammill.

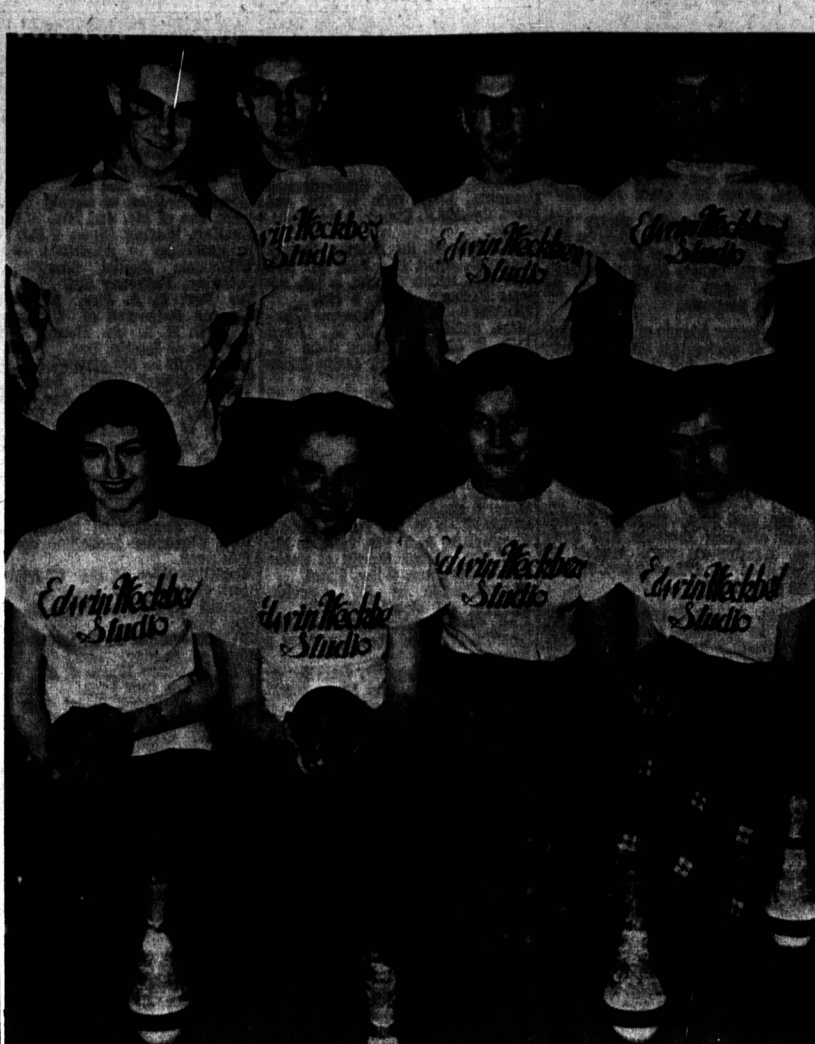
