WILL OPEN SCOTTISH GATHERING AUG. 5

The Earl of Elgin, Sir Edward J. Bruce, K.T., K.M.G., the head of the Royal Scottish House of Bruce and the standing Chairman of the Council of Scottish Clan Chiefs, will honor the Calcedonian Club of Prince Edward Island by officially opening the 52nd annual gathering of the Clubs being held on the Provincial Exhibition Grounds in Charlottetown, August 4th.

Lord Elgin will be making his first appearance before the general public in Canada when he steps onto the platform here. He arrives from Scotland tomorrow. Following his visit here, he and Lady Elgin will go to St. Ann's Cape Breton where he will officially open the Gaelic Mod on August 6th.

The distinguished visitors will remain in a special section of the grandstand at the Exhibition Grounds during the afternoon to watch the various bagpipe contests, the Highland dancing competitions and the Highland Games.

Lord and Lady Elgin will come from Halifax on the morning of August 4. They will be met in Halifax by two members of the Calcedonian Club of Prince Edward Island, Mr. Blair MacDonald, Chief and Honorary Treasurer, and Mr. MacDonald will motor with Lord and Lady Elgin to New Glasgow where they will emplane on the 10-35 a.m. (Standard Time) Maritime Central Airways flight to Charlottetown.

Will Tour Canada

During their stay in Charlottetown, Lord and Lady Elgin will be guests at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce.

The present Earl of Elgin has been Lieutenant of Fife County since 1925. He is Honorary Air Commodore of 948 Squadron, R.A.F., Lieutenant of the Royal Company of Archers, the King's bodyguard for Scotland.

He was chairman of the Carnegie United Kingdom Trust from 1922 to 1949, Grand Master, Mason of Scotland, from 1921 to 1924 and Lord High Commissioner of the Church of Scotland from 1925 to 1926.

Lady Elgin, whom he married in 1921, was formerly the Honorable Katherine Elizabeth Cochrane, D. B.E., daughter of the 1st Baron Cochrane of Cults.

Death in St. John of Mr. Edward A. Murphy

The late Mr. Edward A. Murphy, subject of the following obituary from The New Freeman, Saint John, N.B., was the only brother of the Rev. Gregory Murphy, Rector of Holy Redeemer Parish here, and was well known in this Province. He had many friends in Kinkora.

Stricken with a heart ailment while at his summer residence, Sandy Point Road, on June 30 Edward A. Murphy, 12 Elizabeth Court, died at the General Hospital at an early hour Thursday. He was 47 years of age.

A lifelong resident of Saint John, he was born in the city, a son of the late William J. and Theresa (Mulligan) Murphy. He was widely known as a commercial traveler and had been employed with Thorne's Hardware, Ltd., for the last 10 years in the ship stores department.

Educated in Saint John, Mr. Murphy was employed with George E. Holder and Son, and later with the J. Splane and Comany, ship chandlers.

Active in K. of C. Circles

For 12 years he was a member of Saint John Council No. 937, Knights of Columbus, and during that period he made notable contributions to the work of the Council. In 1949 he was elected recorder of the council, serving for four years. Later he was a trustee and for a year served as chancellor.

On June 3 of this year he was elected to the post of deputy grand knight and would have assumed office July 1.

Mr. Murphy was also a member of the late St. John's Assembly, Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus, where for two years he held the post of faithful admiral.

During his years as a member of the Fourth Degree Assembly, he took an active part in the work of the Catholic Seamen's Club in West Saint John and served for a time as supervisor of the club. Mr. Murphy was also active on other committees and at the time of his death was a member of a special group preparing plans for the redecoration of the K. of C. rooms on Coburg Street, prior to the golden jubilee of the council in November.

In 1953 he represented the local Knights at the golden jubilee observances of the Charlottetown Council.

Mr. Murphy was also an active member of St. Peter's Parish, and of the Holy Name Society, and Altar Society.

A keen yachtsman in his youth, he was a member of the Royal Kennebecasis Yacht Club. He had been active in St. Peter's Home and School Association.

Surviving are his wife, the former Miss Helen Cooper, daughter of Frank Cooper, 3 First Street, and the late Mrs. Cooper; three sons, Paul, William and Terrence (Terry) Murphy, and one daughter, Miss Michelle Murphy, all at home; one brother, Very Rev. J. Gregory Murphy, C.Ss.R., Rector of the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer, Charlottetown, three sisters, Major Margaret Murphy, nursing sister with the United States Army, West Point, N. Y., Mrs. Maurice Cousens, Montreal; Miss Clara Murphy, a practitioner, and uncle, Clement Murphy, Montreal.

The funeral was held on July 5 from the residence to St. Peter's Church where Solemn High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by his brother, Father Murphy, assisted by Very Rev. L. Pearson Comments On Indo-China Truce Commission

CALGARY, (CP)—Canada's participation on the Viet-Nam armistice supervisory commission is the "biggest thing of its kind undertaken by Canada," External Affairs Minister Pearson said here Friday.

Mr. Pearson spent the morning in Calgary enroute to Cranbrook and Vancouver. At Vancouver he will attend the British Empire Games Saturday and with Hon. C. D. Howe, will take part in the opening of the Aluminum Company of Canada's Killam project Sunday.

Mr. Pearson said the Indo-China commission would have a difficult and complicated job. The commission would have neither executive nor enforcement responsibilities but would nevertheless have many delicate tasks to handle in its efforts to keep the peace and ultimately to supervise elections in Viet Nam, Laos and Cambodia.

The minister said he did not expect complete details of the commission's task and Canada's part in it to be known until sometime next week. Preliminary information would be received, however, within a day or so, after the beginning of talks in New Delhi.

RAF Jet Lands At Soviet Air Base

BAD EILSEN, Germany, (AP)—The RAF announced here Friday night that a Meteor jet night fighter plane, missing since Tuesday, landed safely at a Soviet air base in Communist East Germany and both the plane and the two-man crew were being returned.

An RAF spokesman here said that the plane landed at the Soviet air base at Gardelegen when it ran out of fuel.

Armed Men Grab \$1,000 Payroll

TORONTO, (CP)—Two men, one of them armed, casually strolled into a roofing company office in west-end Toronto Friday, held up the company's paymaster and a walk-out with a \$1,000 payroll.

Andrew Gibb, 32, the paymaster, said one of the men held a gun under a handkerchief and ordered him to hand over the payroll he was making up for 12 employees.

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TRANS-CANADA HIGHWAY TENDERS FOR CONCRETE PAVING RECEIVED

The tender of \$157,000, submitted by Morrison and MacRae for concrete paving on the trans-Canada highway from Malpeque Road for a distance of 3.4 miles toward Cornwall, was the lowest received. This was disclosed at noon yesterday when Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways opened the bids at his office in the presence of Premier Matheson, members of the Cabinet, Department engineers and contractors.

The tender for the highway, which will be 22 feet wide, will be submitted to the necessary authority at Ottawa for approval, following the usual custom where joint Dominion and Provincial expenditure is involved.

Other tenders submitted were: Warren Paving Company \$219,800; Island Construction Company \$205,420; Curran and Briggs Ltd., \$190,150; County Construction Company, \$187,050.

Charge Daughter Died By Crime

ROME (AP)—The parents of Wilma Montesi, whose death 15 months ago has rocked Italy's government in a delayed action scandal, have formally charged that she died by crime—not accident.

Previously the Montesi family had maintained that 21-year-old Wilma had drowned while bathing her feet at Ostia beach to rid herself of a foot infection.

The girl's father, carpenter Rodolfo Montesi, and his wife, Maria, had stoutly denied reports that Wilma died at a dose and sex orgy attended by high society and government figures. Publication of the rumors in one paper brought charges against the editor, sensational testimony at his trial and suspension of the proceedings while a new inquiry was made in the girl's death.

There have been unconfirmed reports that the magistrate appointed by the government to investigate the shapely brunette's death, Dr. Raffaello Sape, has found that she was killed, probably by forced drowning.

In their action Thursday, Wilma's parents formally entered themselves as interested parties in the investigation "against all those who will be found responsible for the tragic event."

This action, customary in Italian law, gives them the right to seek damages from guilty persons if any are ever found.

FIRE FOLLOWS BLAST

AMSTERDAM (AP)—Fire broke out in the engine room of the 15,805-ton Panamanian tanker Akkore Tuesday after an explosion during welding repairs. One Dutch fireman was seriously injured. The tanker, owned by the Alcion Steamship Company of London and flying the Panamanian flag, is in dock for inspection.
