PORT HULL HOUSE.—Mr. Thomas Murphy has opened a hotel at Port Hull.

A CENTENARIAN.—Mrs. Charles Delay recently died at St. John, N. B., aged over 100 years.

CAPE BRETON.—All the harbors from Ligon to Cow Bay (coal ports) are now open. Sydney is still closed.

GOVERNMENT.—The Governor General goes to Quebec this week on route for England. He will return in September.

TROOPS FOR HALIFAX.—The S. S. St. Lawrence, is on her way from Portsmouth to Halifax with a detachment of troops for the Garrison.

LOGAN'S TANNERY, Victoria, was partially destroyed by fire on the night of Saturday, 24th inst. Loss not estimated. Insurance, \$15,700.

CHILD MURDER.—A woman named Russia Cooke has been arrested at London-derry, N. S., charged with the murder of her child.

RETIRED.—W. H. Findley Esq., has withdrawn from the firm of Weeks & Findley. Mr. Weeks will continue the business in his own name.

THE FIRST ARRIVAL.—The Bark Hertha, owned by Hon. J. C. Pope, arrived at Fort Mulgrave on Friday last. She is the first inland vessel from Liverpool this spring.

ENTERPRISE.—The enterprising firm of Reid Bros., purchased the premises at the head of Queen's Wharf, from Mr. D. Grady, the other day, for \$5,500.—Summerside Journal.

SHERIFFS.—The following gentlemen have been appointed Sheriffs for the ensuing year.—W. R. Watson, Queen's County; M. McCormack, King's County; J. Mc Nutt, Prince County.

HARD TIMES.—The Halifax Herald states that notwithstanding the cry of "hard times" the customs receipts for duties for this month, up to yesterday, amounting to nearly \$120,000. There is corn in Egypt yet.

CABINET CHANGES.—Possibilities of changes in the Cabinet are rumored. It is said Mr. Scott will go on the Bench of the Supreme Court, and Mr. Huntington retire. Messrs. Holt and Blake are spoken of as their successors.

INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION.—The Manufacturers and Mechanics of St. John intend holding an Exhibition or Industrial Fair, on the 7th September next. The Exhibition will be open to competitors from all the Maritime Provinces.

SUPREME COURT.—A petition for the appointment of Hon. W. A. Henry, of Halifax, as one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of appeal for the Dominion of Canada, is in circulation in the Parliamentary and legal circles of Nova Scotia.

HOME FOR FALLEN WOMEN.—Rev. John S. Clark, of Ashland, New York, has left by rail, eight thousand dollars, to found a house of refuge for fallen women, at Halifax. He also left a thousand dollars to four Canadian Churches.—H. Chronicle.

THE BROWN-SADLER RACE A FEELER.—"Bell's Life in London," under date of the 3rd inst., announces in so many words that the English "Champion" has backed down from the proposition to row against Brown anywhere or for any money.—H. Reporter.

INSURGENT.—The Ottawa Citizen states that Lord Carnarvon is indignant at the state of affairs between British Columbia and the Dominion Government, and says Mackenzie will yet find it necessary to go to England personally and enter into explanations with the Imperial authorities.

THE PACIFIC RAILWAY.—Mr. Richard Nagle, the "straight-out" Crit candidate, who opposed the election for Ottawa, of Dan. O'Donoghue to the Ontario Legislature, in 1874, has publicly denounced the Pacific Railway policy of the Mackenzie Administration, and endorsed that of Sir John Macdonald.

Fifteen shares of the Merchants Bank were sold at 175. As 29 per cent. on the par value of these shares is refunded in November from premium on new stock, the net value of the purchase is 155.

MARRIAGE IN HIGH LIFE.—Miss Lewis, daughter of the Bishop of Ontario, was last week, married to Mr. Hamilton, nephew of Senator Hamilton. The bride's father performed the ceremony. There were eight bridesmaids and as many groomsmen. The Earl and Countess Dufferin were present, with Gen. Smyth, Mr. Vail, Minister of Militia, and many other prominent persons. It was the grandest affair of the kind ever known in Ottawa. The wedding presents are worth over \$25,000.

DEATH UNDER PECULIAR CIRCUMSTANCES.—On Saturday, a boy named Henry McDade, son of Henry McDade who lives on Main Street, Portland, died under very peculiar circumstances. On Tuesday evening he went home from school and complained of a pain in one of his hands. Nothing was thought of it, but during the night, the pain continued to increase, and when the boy arose in the morning, his symptoms were so bad that he was sent to Dr. Travers, in the city, for medical aid. The opinion of the doctor was that if the boy grew better at all, he would have an abscess on the shoulder, the pain having descended to it. The boy returned home and took to his bed from which he never rose. The inflammation gradually extended over the whole body and so great was the pain that he was unable to lie in bed for one to hold his hand on the bed for any length of time. One side of the body began to discolor on Saturday morning just before the deceased expired. It was the only son and much thought of by his companions in school.—St. John Tel.

ODD-FELLOWS' CELEBRATION.—Monday last being the anniversary of the Independent Order of Odd-fellows, was observed as a gala day by the Odd-fellows of this city. When the morning dawned, the prospects of a fine day for the celebration were very poor; yet the threatened rain held off beautifully, and as the clouds rolled away, the day became all that could be desired. Long before twelve o'clock, the hour named, a large crowd was assembled in front of the Odd-fellows' Hall, to witness the ascent of the balloon, which however was not put up, owing to the prevalence of too much wind. At 3 o'clock, p. m., the Odd-fellows, preceded by their standard bearers carrying a large and very handsome banner, issued from their Hall, and headed by Galbraith's Band, marched in procession to St. Paul's Church, where Evensong was said by the Ven. Archdeacon Read, and an appropriate sermon, illustrative of the objects of the order, was preached by the Rev. D. Fitzgerald. After service the Brethren retired in procession and marched along several of the principal streets, accompanied by the band, which played the "Odd-fellow's Quick Step" in good style. The procession was about eighty strong and was one of the most respectable "turn outs" we ever remember to have seen in Charlottetown. At eight o'clock a grand literary and musical entertainment was given in the Market Hall, which was more crowded upon this occasion than we have ever before seen it. Long before the entertainment began, it was impossible to obtain seats or standing room. The number present we should estimate to be nearly, if not quite 1000 persons. The entertainment opened with an address by the chairman Bro. R. R. Fitzgerald, which although well constructed and delivered, occupied more time than the occasion called for. Readings were given by Messrs. Geo. Peake and P. S. MacGowan. Bro. DeBlois, DesFrisay and T. L. Chapelle. Under the musical direction of Professor Earle, songs were given by Bros. Beer, L. P. DesFrisay, McLeod and White, with full choruses by the Brethren. Messrs. Earle and Vinnicombe treated us to some very fine instrumental music, as did also Galbraith's Band, which was in attendance. We have no space to review the whole programme, so must content ourselves by remarking that Mr. Geo. Peake's and Bro. DesFrisay's readings brought down the house, while Bro. Chappelle's recitation was true to the life. The solos of Bros. Beer and L. P. DesFrisay were capital, as were also the choruses and the opening solo. "Sound the glad chorus." The Tab. leaux of "Visiting Brethren" was very well rendered, the only fault being that the sick man looked too rosy and jolly to have watched the matter with him. Owing to a mistake, one scene only of the second tableau, "the gambler's fate," was presented, which left the audience rather in doubt as to what inference they were to draw from the representation. On the whole, the entertainment passed off well, and the Odd Fellows have reason to congratulate themselves upon the success which attended the observance of their Natal Day.

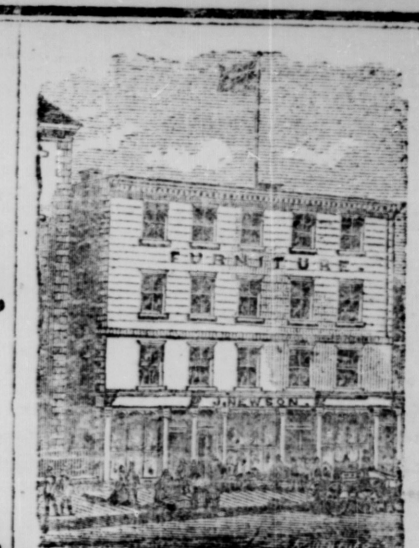
