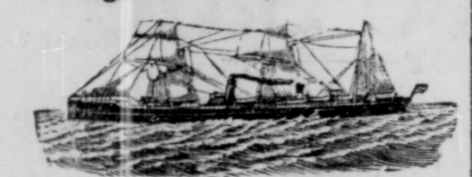

The Transvaal War

The British Army.

In the London Times of recent date is published a summary of the latest returns to the British army (white troops only) By this it appears that the effective strength is 225,027. The strength of the first class of the Army Reserve, which a recent call has shown to be available in full number, is 78,798. The army reserve is composed of trained soldiers under middle age, really as effective as the active army ranks. It will be seen that with the full reserve called out to take the places of men sent to war, Britain can put into South Africa, 78,798 soldiers without reducing by one man the strength of the forces she has had anywhere in the world.

The Basutos.

A distinguished officer, speaking on this subject, said a few days ago: "We have done everything possible to prevent the Basutos rising. They hate the Boers, because, like all natives who have come in contact with them, they have suffered constant illusage from the Boers. But what we want is not that the Basutos should rise, but that they should remain as they are, a strong armed force, as a protection on one side, while we advance on the other. The whole plan of campaign has been based upon the armed neutrality of the Basutos. If they break out in our favor—as, of course, it would be—then we find ourselves with quite a different condition of affairs to deal with. It would necessitate the entire reorganization of the plan of campaign. We don't want the Basutos, the Zulus or any other natives mixing up in our campaign, which we are more than able to carry out without any aid of any kind. We had only to hold up a finger and we had all the natives with us, because they have learned to have a holy dread of the brutal methods of the Boers, but special agents have been sent among the natives, telling them to remain quiet. That had an excellent effect among them, because it showed them our confidence. This they fully understood, but now that we have had certain petty reverses they don't understand why they should not come to our rescue. There lies the danger. They are fighters, every one. The war fever runs high among them, but we have got our people among them, and we hope we can stop them making a rush at the Boers—a move which would delight the Basutos, but place us in endless difficulties. But, if, however, any further disaster were to occur to British forces I fear nothing could stop the Basutos but I don't foresee any such disaster."

A REIGN OF TERROR.

Boer Soldiers Simply Laid Hand on What They Wanted.

Gustav Schlacht arrived in New York recently on the steamer St. Paul, having come through from Johannesburg, South Africa, without stopping. Mr. Schlacht was the publisher of a paper in Johannesburg, called the African Jewish Gazette. In describing the situation prior to his departure, Mr. Schlacht said:

"I never saw such a mixed up and lawless place as was Johannesburg when I left there. Before this war the city had an Uitlander population of about 60,000, of which the greater part was English, with the Germans next, while I doubt if there were over 100

Boers in the place. Of course, the city government and police were in the hands of the Boers, but few Boers cared to live there because the city contained so many Uitlanders, whom they hate.

"The week before I left Johannesburg, 30,000 foreigners left the place, and I understand that the other 30,000 made their exodus during the week immediately following my departure. They made straight for Cape Colony and the trains were jammed to suffocation. In one small car I saw fifty men and women—but were forced to travel in cattle cars.

"Meanwhile a veritable reign of terror prevailed in Johannesburg. The Boer soldiery, which was stationed there in force, simply laid their hands on everything that was valuable and carried it off without ceremony. No foreigner's property was safe. Flour, oats, potatoes and all sorts of provisions were seized by them, and horses they made especial prey of for use in the army. One foreigner was held up while driving in the street, his horse was taken out of the shafts, and led away, and he was jeeringly informed that walking was good.

"The Boers looted everything without mercy and it will be a pretty hard state of affairs that we foreigners will find if we ever get back there. I left my partner in charge of my printing office, but I never expect to see it again.

"I do not think the Boers can accurately be called a civilized nation. They still have savage traits and they are uniformly testy and quick tempered."
