

Billy Daniels Rates Williams Over Clay

NEW YORK (AP) — Cassius Clay calls himself "the greatest" but he's far from that in Billy Daniels' estimation.

Daniels' size-up of the unbeaten Clay encouraged the Jones camp but had little effect on the odds. Clay was held as a 13-to-5 or 3-to-1 favorite, depending on where a bettor shopped in town, for the sold-out 10 rounder in Madison Square Garden Wednesday night.

Daniels, a gangling heavyweight from Brooklyn, lost on cuts to Clay in the seventh round last May 9 and was outpointed by Cleveland Williams in a bruising battle last Saturday night.

Asked to compare Clay and Williams, Daniels said Monday: "There's no comparison. Williams hits much harder. I'd fight Clay every night in the week. But that Williams, man, he's a load of dynamite."

Clay had predicted Daniels would "fall in five." Daniels never hit the canvas once. Further he rocked Cassius twice with long rights to the head.

Ring magazine rates Clay second among the heavyweight contenders. Jones third, Williams sixth and Daniels eighth. The World Boxing Association has Clay a second, Williams fourth, Jones fifth, and Daniels sixth.

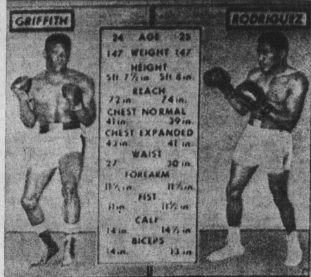

Eight Players Suspended For Stick-Swinging Brawl

REGINA (CP) — Eight players were suspended and fines totalling \$135 were levied by Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League commissioner Frank Boucher Monday following a stick-swinging brawl during the third period of a playoff game between Moose Jaw Canucks and Melville Millionaires in Melville Saturday.

The brawl sent two Melville players and a linesman to hospital for treatment.

All-star defenceman Gary Kilpatrick of Moose Jaw was fined \$25 and suspended indefinitely. Melville goaltender Harvey Leafold, who suffered back injuries

in the fracas, Dave Ferguson and Doug Ferguson of Melville and Ben Greco and Don Nolin of Moose Jaw were suspended for the remainder of the series.

Melville leads the best-of-seven quarter-final 2-2.

Jim Wiste of Moose Jaw and Don Gelowitz of Melville were given one-game suspensions and drew automatic \$5 fines for receiving game misconduct penalties.

Rookie Gary Longman of Moose Jaw and John Thompson of Melville were fined \$10 each in Coaches Metro Prystaj of

Moose Jaw and Don Abel of Melville were fined \$25 for failing to control their players.

Dave Ferguson was the most severely injured. A tendon in one finger was cut when he received a slash requiring eight stitches. A head cut was closed with 14 stitches.

Leafold's neck was injured when he was struck several times with a stick and linesman Ted Varlan had a cut in his hand closed with 14 stitches.

Thirty-three penalties totalling 174 minutes were handed out in the game.

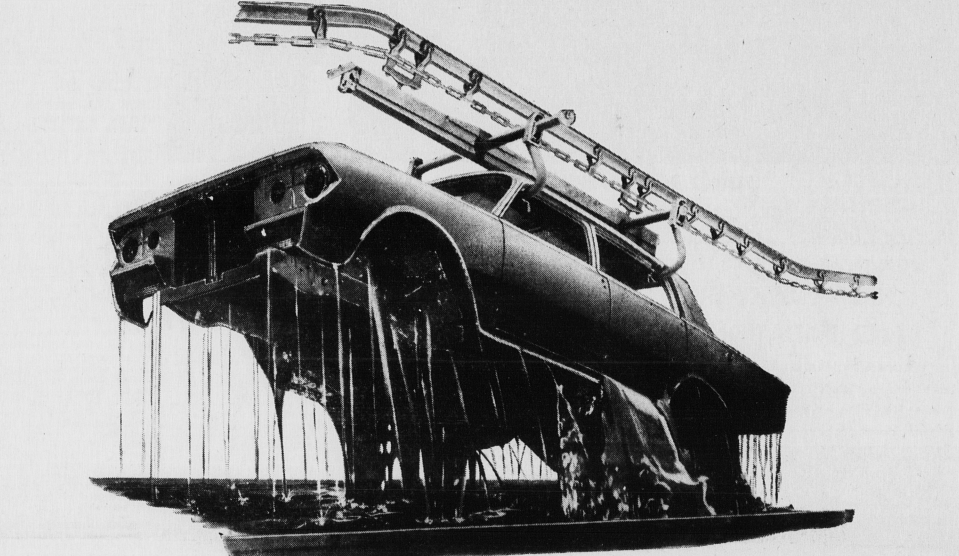
This year's show is heralded as the greatest laugh hit in a long time and patrons can be assured of a great night's fun.
