Mermaid Herd Traces Breeding To Royal Herd

A herd of Aberdeen Angus cattle that traces its breeding back to a cow from the herd of Queen Victoria which was champion of England and Scotland in the 1880's, has been brought to this province. Its most outstanding individuals will be shown at the Atlantic Winter Fair, and some of them will be sold at an Angus breeders' sale, in mid-November or possibly a bit later.

The herd of 20 cows, 15 bred heifers and a dozen calves were brought here recently by Leo P. McIsaac, Miramichi, who is president of the Maritime Angus Breeders Association and one of the main players in the all-black beef cattle in Prince Edward Island.

Island breeders will be invited to consign cattle to the sale for which a definite date will be set later, Mr. McIsaac revealed.

Pride of the herd which was purchased from H. L. MacIsaac, Marguerville, N.B., is the six-year-old cow, Rosebud of Catalina, an animal that Mr. McIsaac believes may well take the grand female championship at Halifax on show day Thursday, Nov. 14, when the best classes will be shown.

This cow has been a grand champion at Fredericton, N.B. and she was named Maritime Junior champion at the old Maritime Winter Fair at Antigonish when she was a calf.

It is Rosebud's dam, an 11-year-old cow that traces back to the Queen Victoria herd in 1888, and is a direct descendant of the famous championing of the February calf of the Catalogue.

Student Use Of Libraries Is Reported On Increase

Increasing use of library facilities by students and the need for more books in school libraries were noted by branch librarians who gathered at the P.E.I. Libraries Wednesday and yesterday for their annual convention.

They discussed the use of reference books, such as encyclopedias, atlases, biographical dictionaries, and considered what additions might be made to the library to bring these books up to date.

An open forum on good public library service dealt with the place of the library in the community and its relation to local government, the area served by the library, the maintenance of adequate bookstock, and library buildings and library hours. Improvements in library quarters were noted in Wellington, Borden, Alberton, Georgetown, Tignish, with O'Leary and St. Peter's planning for better facilities.

Everyday matters of library management were considered in small group discussion, with attention focussing on the problem of overdue books, the circulation of magazines, and observance of Young Canada's Book Week, Nov. 16-22.

A project suggested for Centennial Year, 1964, was the gathering of local history materials such as scrapbooks, school year books, minutes of organizations, and programs of local events.

Accused's Committed To Supreme Court Trial

Following the preliminary hearing in city police court yesterday, Arnold James Biso, 199 Hillsboro Street, Charlottetown, was committed to the Supreme Court for trial on the charge of breaking and entering the Charlottetown Curling Club, by Magistrate A.J. Haislam, QC.

Prosecutor A.A. Scallan, continued the case for the crown, and called as witnesses: Cst. Charles Reedy, city police; Cst. Lance MacPhail, Sherwood, Cst. Douglas Taylor, city police, and Cst. John Hode, RCMP Crime Laboratory, Sackville, N.B.

Crown exhibits introduced included clothing and money obtained from the accused, and a sample of fluorescent detection powder, which according to evidence was found on Biso's clothes.

The accused, not represented by counsel, gave evidence on his own behalf and called Lloyd MacLean, Charlottetown, charged with possession of stolen goods valued at over \$50, copper wire was remanded to October 12 for sentence.

Lois Kaye, Charlottetown, was fined \$15 and costs or five days on a charge of speeding, and \$5 and costs or two days for failing to halt at a stop sign.

Joseph Gass, Charlottetown, charged with being drunk and disorderly, was remanded to October 11, with bail set at \$1.

The case of J. C. Saint and Co., charged with a meter violation, was further adjourned to Oct. 17.

There will be two classes, one for beginners and one for those who have engaged in skeet shooting before. Prizes will be offered.
