

Stress Efforts Should Be Made To Cut Housing Costs

TORONTO (CP) — The Canadian Construction Association, in a far-ranging statement of policy for 1957, Wednesday approved resolutions, stressing that efforts should be made to control housing costs and urging the federal government to consider on a national scale the restoration of old but still sound dwellings.

Canadians to own their own homes. To aid that aim, the CCA suggested housing costs could be controlled through greater individual productivity, more cost-conscious design, on-site assembly line construction and modernization of building codes.

Regarding older dwellings, the association urged the federal government, private industry and lending institutions to work toward improving existing housing. The resolution said new construction cannot do the whole job of providing all Canadians with "adequate" housing, "particularly when the capital demands of industrial and engineering construction are being felt so keenly."
