The Patriot is angry because THE EXAMINER refuted, so easily and successfully, its false charges and mean insinuations in respect to the Commissioner of Public Works.

Our contemporary does not, evidently, like comparisons. They reflect too strongly upon the extravagance and corruption of the Opposition party.

The statement that it cost 17 per cent. to expend the money on roads is also incorrect. The sum of \$2,763.79 paid supervisors was not a remuneration for the expenditure of the \$17,490.67 on roads only.

What will the Patriot say to this? Will it manfully acknowledge its error, or endeavor, by quibbling and insinuation, to maintain in the minds of its readers the false idea that "something must be wrong!"

In the year 1888, \$17,000 were appropriated for roads, and \$17,490.67 were spent. How does this compare with the year 1878, when \$25,005 were appropriated and \$52,433.18 spent?

Our contemporary is certainly spoiling for something to grumble about; and the cheque which THE EXAMINER occasionally receives from Ottawa troubles it greatly.
