Automobile Insurance Rates To Be Down In This Province

TORONTO (CP)—Motorists in six provinces will have to pay more next year for automobile insurance—with increases ranging up to 26 per cent—says an All Canada Insurance Federation survey released here.

The survey forecast rates will go up in Ontario, Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba and Alberta. There will be decreases in Prince Edward Island, Quebec and British Columbia.

The government-operated insurance rate for Saskatchewan, jumped 11 per cent last spring, probably will remain the same for some months, the survey said.

Across the country, the survey says, "the accident rate has brightened slightly with fewer insurance claims being made for each automobile. However, the average cost of each accident is increasing steadily."

The forecast included: —Newfoundland: Rates up an average 2.5 per cent. Decreases of eight per cent in St. John's and nine per cent on the Avalon Peninsula; increases of 11 per cent in the rest of the island and six per cent in Labrador.

—Prince Edward Island: Rates down an average 7.5 per cent throughout the province.

—Nova Scotia: Rates up an average 8.4 per cent. Increases of five per cent in Halifax, seven per cent in Sydney and 10 per cent in the rest of the province.

—New Brunswick: Rates up an average six per cent in all parts, except the counties of Madawaska, Restigouche and Gloucester, where increases will average 16 per cent.

—Quebec: Rates down an average four per cent in Montreal and Sherbrooke-Lemoyville; down one or two per cent in the remainder, except for a five per cent rise in Hull and district.

—Manitoba: Rates up nine per cent in Winnipeg, St. Boniface and Brandon; remaining at present levels in northern Manitoba; up 11 per cent in the rest of the province.

—Alberta: Rates up an average 7.5 per cent. Calgary, up two per cent; Edmonton, up seven per cent; Banff, Camrose, Drumheller and parts of Drumheller Valley, up 15 per cent; northern Alberta, up 11 per cent; rest of the province, up 13 per cent.

—British Columbia: Rates down an average 3.2 per cent. Decreases of five per cent in Vancouver; nine per cent in Victoria, the Fraser Valley and the Okanagan; increases of two per cent in the rest of the province.

Most insurance companies now are printing and distributing new rate manuals which will take effect after Jan. 1, the survey says.

Most companies also will use a new classification system next year giving a larger discount to drivers who have gone three or more years without a claim — 40 per cent discount compared to the present 35 per cent.

Economic Advice Is Given To American Government

WASHINGTON (CP)—A blue-chip private committee of businessmen and academics advises the U.S. government to ensure continued confidence in the American dollar by:

—Fashioning a 1967 budget surplus through spending less and perhaps invoking a temporary tax increase to blunt domestic demand;

—Undertaking foreign-bound American development capital;

—Trimming NATO defence costs;

—Continuing efforts for agreement on "paper gold," a new global reserves unit bolstering gold, the U.S. dollar and other internationally acceptable mediums of exchange.

The report by the 200-member committee for economic development is significant because of the stature of its members, who include the likes of former treasury secretary Douglas Dillon.

It is significant too as a national pointer to the problems facing President Johnson, now working to reconcile his 1967 budget with the problems of an economy inflated by the Vietnam war. Considerable uncertainty exists about just what forces now predominate in the economy—whether a tax increase now would hasten some recession.

LOSE AIRCRAFT The president Tuesday said he'll need another \$9,000,000,000 or so for the current fiscal year ending next June 30 to help bear war costs. Aircraft losses alone over heavily-defended North Viet Nam rise steadily. Last week, the committee urged a "substantial surplus" of more than \$3,000,000,000 for the budget to curb inflation it said has been evident since war costs began to bound upward in mid-1965.

OTTAWA (CP)—Tenders for construction of two supply ships for the navy are under study. Industry Minister Drury told the Commons.

He was replying to Thomas M. Bell (PC—Saint John-Albert) who asked when an announcement could be expected on contracts since tenders were put in two months ago.

Mr. Drury said the bids are complicated and are under study by the government. He hoped there could be an announcement of the contracts soon.
