TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) The Crimes Bill. LONDON, June 17. Several amendments to the Crimes Bill were offered and defeated in the Commons this evening. When 10 o'clock arrived the Ministerial benches rapidly filled—the members pouring in from the lobbies. The Parnellites simultaneously arose and left the House, the chairman twice calling upon them to return. Amid great confusion a division was ordered, and clause six was adopted 332 to 163. The Gladstonians, who went out, returned after the voting, but a division having been declared immediately, arose in a body and withdrew amid Conservative cheers and laughter. The Unionists voted solidly with the Government. The remaining clauses were then put and carried without comment. The bill passed the committee stage, the Conservatives again cheering. The report stage of the bill is fixed for the 27th inst.

Steamer Burned. DETROIT, Mich., June 18. The steamer Champlain, having on board 30 to 40 persons, composed of passengers and crew, was burned this morning at one o'clock six miles out from Charlevoix. So rapidly did the flames spread that the steamer had to be abandoned in ten minutes, and before the boats could be lowered. Twenty lives are known to have been lost.

Warlike Movement. LAHORE, June 17. It is rumored that telegrams have been received from London ordering the Indian Government to furnish troops to the Afghan frontier. It is also said that orders have been issued for the completion of the railway line to Candahar, and the extension of the Preshawar railway to Junrood.

Commercial Union. TORONTO, June 17. An adjourned meeting of the Board of Trade was held to-night to discuss the question of commercial union with the United States when the resolution against the scheme was carried by a vote of 63 to 40.

Welcoming O'Brien. LONDON, June 17. When the steamer Adriatic passed Copenhagen last night she was greeted by bonfires all along the coast as a welcome by the people to Mr. O'Brien, who was on board.

At Windsor. LONDON, June 17. The Queen arrived at Windsor to-day. She was heartily cheered by people along the route from the railway station.

The Wheat Circle. CHICAGO, June 17. There were no new or sensational developments in the affairs of the bursted wheat circle to-day.
