**Fall Arrangement.**

**THE** Mails for the United Kingdom, the neighboring Provinces, the United States, &c., will, until further notice, be closed at the General Post Office, Charlottetown, as follows, viz:—

For Canada, New Brunswick and the United States, via Shediac, every Monday and Thursday evening, at 7 o'clock.

For Nova Scotia, via Pictou, every Saturday and Wednesday evening, at 7 o'clock.

Mails for Great Britain, Newfoundland and the West Indies, every alternate Saturday and Wednesday evening, at 7 o'clock, as follows, viz:—

Saturday, Nov. 14,	Wednesday, Dec. 2,
Wednesday, " 18,	Saturday, " 12,
Saturday, " 28	Wednesday, " 16.

Mails for Summerside and St. Eleanor's, to be forwarded per Steamer, will be closed every Monday and Thursday evening, at 7 o'clock.

Letters to be registered and newspapers must be posted half an hour before the time of closing the Mails.

**NOTICE.**

**HIS** Honor the Lieutenant Governor in Council has been pleased to approve of the following modifications in the Postal Arrangement between the United States and this Island, viz:—

On and after the first day of November next, the postage on a single letter shall be **FOUR PENCE**, if prepaid at the Mailing Office, and **Ten Cents**, (equal to sixpence) if posted unpaid; and for other than single letters the same charge shall be made for each additional half ounce, or fraction thereof. Letters for **British Columbia, California, and Oregon**, shall be **Sixpence**, (if prepaid,) per half ounce.
