THE SURVEY on the schr. "Four Brothers," ashore at Canso on the 9th inst., condemned the vessel, and the cargo of 4000 bushels of potatoes is advertised for sale to-morrow, at 12 o'clock, noon.

THE second trial of the Osborne family for the murder of Timothy McCarthy, at Shediac, will commence to-morrow. The Dowd murder trial commenced at St. Andrew's to-day.

REMEMBER that the Rev. R. B. McDonald lectures on "How to read and what to read," in the Athenaeum, this evening. This is the first of a course of lectures which will be held under the auspices of the Reform Club of this city.

A GRAND banquet will be given to the Hon. J. C. Pope, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, by his friends and supporters, at the Rankin House, this evening. The room in which the banquet will be held is beautifully decorated, and flags are strung across Water Street.

As will be seen by advertisement, a meeting of the manufacturers of this City will be held in the Reform Club Hall to-morrow evening. The meeting is, we understand, called to consider the best means of protecting the interests of the manufacturers, in view of the decision given by the Master of the Rolls in the case of Alley vs. Duchemin.

BURGLARY.—We learn that one night last week Thomas Fennessy burglariously entered the shop of Mr. Peardon, Great George Street. Shortly after his entrance he was captured, but, through the adroitness of the fellow, he made good his escape before the police could be called in. He is still at large.

A TERRIBLE FATE.—Louis Bechler was buried by the caving in of a well at Newark on Tuesday. The workmen partly dug him out, but his legs were fastened in the debris, so that he could not be extricated. Suddenly another cave occurred, and he was slowly swallowed up. Bechler knew his fate was sealed, and cried in pitiable tones to his employer to look out for his children.

THE Master of the Rolls to-day delivered Judgment in the case of Alley vs. Duchemin, which has occupied the time of the Court of Chancery during Thursday and Friday last. His Honor refused to dissolve the injunction granted to Mr. Alley, and directed that it be continued until the hearing or further order of the Court. The plaintiff has to undertake to abide by any order the Court may make as to damages. We will, to-morrow, give the Judgment in full, as it is most important to mechanics.

JOHN McLEAN, of Fraser's Mountain, near New Glasgow, N. S., left his home on Wednesday morning to look for some cattle. Not returning, search was made, and his body was found by the roadside on Wednesday. The deceased had lived in town for some weeks before his death, having exchanged his farm for a house in New Glasgow. He repented of the bargain and it weighed on his mind, causing severe nervous depression, which caused many sleepless nights. It is possible that weariness of body and mind overcame him when in search of his cows, and that he sat down, fell asleep and became chilled to death. He said frequently during last week that his mental distress would kill him. His father, mother, and a brother, all met with sudden deaths.

THE Progress remarks that while the Dominion campaign was going on the Patriot professed to be thoroughly acquainted with the workings of the protective system which the Conservative party advocated. Indeed, a person reading the Patriot at that time would imagine that Sir John A. McDonald had taken the editor into his confidence, so thoroughly versed was he in the details of the National Policy. A tax was to be put on salt, flour, coal, iron, and every article of general consumption. The taxes of the people were to be higher; times would grow worse, and depression and discontent would reign everywhere. The Patriot appeared to know what was meant by a protective system much better than Mr. Pope or any other Conservative. How does it happen that now the Patriot seeks information in regard to the proposed National Policy from Mr. Pope?

CHARLES RILEY was drowned off Spurr Cove, St. John, on Friday last. The Telegraph says: The deceased had loaded his boat with barrel headings at Cushing's mill, just above the Falls, and put out into the river for his destination at Indiantown. The current either proved too strong for him, or else he did not take sufficient lead along shore before striking out into the full strength of the stream; at all events, Riley's boat was drawn over the pitch of the Falls, the craft was overturned, and he was washed out. Riley succeeded in gaining a position upon the boat's bottom, and floated down with it towards Split Rock. Evidently fearing that he would be drawn into the whirlpools under the bridge, Riley jumped from the boat and endeavored to swim to the eastern shore. One of the "boils" peculiar to the Falls drew him under water almost immediately on his leaving the boat, and he did not reappear.
