

Buying Popularity.

A STORY OF THE CROWN PRINCE OF GERMANY AND TWO PAIR OF SHOES.

The Crown Prince allows no opportunity to escape him of adding to his popularity. The following is an illustration:—The other day the Crown Prince and Crown Princess were enjoying a morning walk in the Tiergarten, followed by a lady, when they met a poor woman selling cheap shoes, known as Fitz-Parker. The prince stopped, and while the Princess looked on with amusement, asked the price of a pair. The woman stammered out, "Your Highness, please your Excellency." Encouraged by the Prince's smile, however, she at last regained her presence of mind and thinking the least she could do for such an exalted personage was to take something off her charge, she suggested one mark per pair, being twenty-five pence below the usual figure. Producing Mineral Wool.

By the ordinary process of producing mineral wool, the manufacturer has resorted to blowing jets of steam or air against a small stream of molten slag, covering the latter into fine vitrified fibres; but in this way only a portion of the slag is converted into fibre, the rest forming hard granules or shot, which has been difficult to separate from the fibre, the operation having a tendency to break up the latter and make several inferior grades of the wool. A recent improvement is found to succeed fully meet this difficulty; that is, the stream of molten slag is made to fall into a space in front of a central steam jet pipe, with flattened orifice, tending to throw the stream of slag in fan-like space—side jets being arranged to then meet the spreading stream of slag and force it inward and upward by a twisting motion, but all the time under the action of the steam jets, until the stream of molten slag is discharged in conical shape and enters the end of the receiving chamber. By this means it is claimed, the entire product of the blow is what is known as No. 1 wool, the product being light and soft, uniform in quality, and free from granules or shot.

Free Trade.

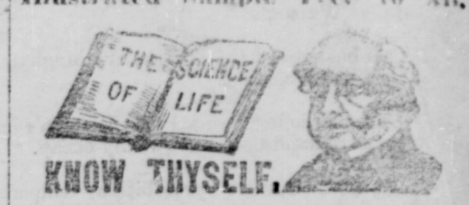
