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Top Off Chicken Dinner With A Peach-Pie Cake

"Stewing chicken is a good buy Madame," remarked the Chef. "So it is sensible to have a chicken dinner during the week and not wait for Sunday. When chicken is lower in price than other meats, we can use it more often by varying the recipe."

Stir in 1 1/2 c. grated raw potato. Slow-boil 15 min. Add 1 tsp. minced parsley.
Peach pie-cake: Apricots, blueberries or pitted cherries may be used instead of peaches. This consists of two parts: Peach filling and sweet cookie pastry.

Peach filling: Heat 3/4 c. canned peach juice. Combine 2 tsp. cornstarch with 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 1/4 tsp. powdered cinnamon and 1/2 tsp. salt. Stir in the peach juice. Cook-stir 1 min. or until boiling.
Add 2 c. drained, canned sliced peaches and 1 tsp. crushed fine-grated lemon rind. Cool until tepid.

Sweet cookie pastry: Into a bowl, sift together 2 c. pre-sifted enriched flour, 1/2 c. powdered sugar and 1 1/2 tsp. salt. Heap it up. Make a depression in the centre. Into this drop 2 egg yolks, the crushed grated rind 1/2 lemon and 3/4 c. room-soft shortening. Mix with a pastry blender until the shortening is distributed in small flakes. With a fork gradually mix in 6 tsp. cold water.

Roll 1/4 in. thick. Fit onto 2 (8 in.) pans. Do not build up the edges.
Bake 15 min. in a moderate oven, 375 degrees F., or until lightly browned. Cool.

To put together: Spread 1 pie-cake layer with the cooled peach filling. Top with the second layer. Dust over a mixture of powdered sugar and cinnamon.

Season chicken fricassee gravy with celery salt and a little powdered ginger.

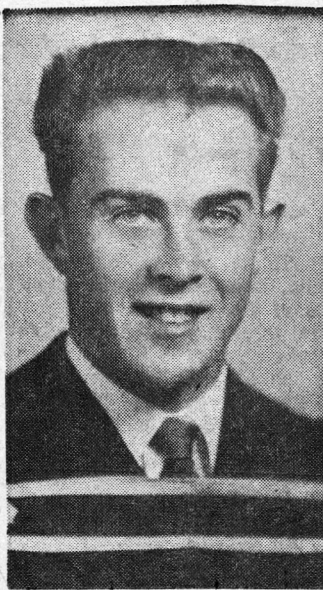
ST. ANTHONY C.W.L.
