Egypt Moves To Expel British From Canal Zone

Ferry Refloated Saturday And Now In Pictou Drydock

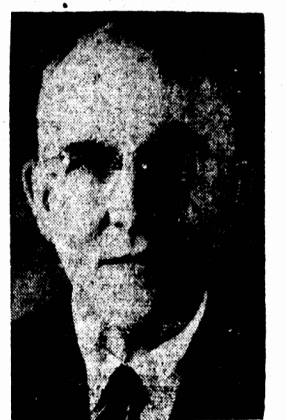
The "Charles A. Dunning" of the Northumberland Ferries Limited was successfully refloated Saturday afternoon after she had run aground in a heavy fog Friday. The ship had grounded on Gull Rock, near her Caribou, N. S. terminus. Efforts to get her off late Friday night and early Saturday morning resulted in failure as the sea was too rough. Action Will Also Include The Sudan

CAIRO, Oct. 8 — (CP) — Egypt tonight announced a series of decrees designed to throw British troops out of the Suez Canal zone and take absolute control of the Sudan, at present jointly administered by Britain and Egypt. An official British Embassy statement said the decision is illegal, arguing that the 1936 Anglo-Egyptian treaty contains no provision for denunciation at any time. British troops in the Suez Canal zone towns of Port Said, Ismailia and Suez were ordered into camp and leave was cancelled. Prime Minister Mustafa Nahas Pasha, leader of the Wafdist (nationalist) Party, introduced in a cheering parliament the bills to carry out cancellation of the Anglo-Egyptian treaty and abrogate the 20-year pact under which British troops are allowed to guard the Suez Canal, vital link between the West and the Orient. His speech came less than a week after British oilmen were forced out of Iran, another country in the troubled Middle East. Nahas Pasha also asked for approval of decrees proclaiming King Farouk as first king of Egypt and the Sudan, and a third dissolving the 1899 accord which put the Sudan under joint British and Egyptian administration. The decrees will be discussed at the next session of Parliament in November. He recalled that abrogation of the 1936 treaty was forecast in the King's speech opening parliament earlier this year. Egypt could not be patient any longer, he declared. He said the treaty was signed when Egypt was menaced by the Axis powers. The defeat of the Axis and establishment of the U.N. had "put an end to all menace."

Sudden Passing Of Ch'town Business Man

One of the leading figures in the business life of this Province, Mr. J. P. Simmonds, President of the Central Creameries Ltd., of Charlottetown, passed away suddenly in the Prince Edward Island Hospital Sunday night following a heart attack. Only a short time before he had attended church services in Trinity United Church where he was an Elder and a member of the Board of Trustees. During both Sunday services he had assisted in serving communion. Following the seizure at his home, he was taken to hospital by ambulance, but after lying briefly under medical treatment, passed quietly away. The late John Percival Simmonds was born in Kingston, P. E. I., on April 5, 1885, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Francis Simmonds. Later the family moved to Marshfield, where Mr. Simmonds attended school and grew to young manhood. At nearby Dunstaffnage he took employment in the Dunstaffnage cheese and butter factory, and first became interested in the line of endeavour in which he was later to become outstandingly successful. Royal Party Plane Over P. E. I. Yesterday

The B. A. O. C. strato-cruiser, carrying Princess Elizabeth and her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, to Montreal where they will commence their tour of Canada, passed over the Island in the vicinity of Charlottetown yesterday morning. Due to the height at which the plane was flying and the overcast weather, it could not be seen, but it made radio contact with the radio range station on the Brackley Point Road at 10:15 a.m. The call was a purely routine one, made by all planes flying over the Island, for purposes of position fixing. The local station was thus a link in the elaborate chain of land and sea communications systems set up to ensure the safe passage of the Royal Party in the long flight from London to Montreal.

Princess And Husband Capture Hearts Of Huge Assembly At Airport



The enthusiastic crowd, after cutting loose with volleys of uproar as the Royal Pair went through their functions on Canadian soil, finally surged through police lines and surrounded their limousine as it made a walking-pace tour of the airport perimeter with the Princess and her husband obviously enjoying the unscheduled demonstration. Later, another insistent call from the crowd brought a sort of command appearance from the Prince and Princess. They returned to the observation platform of their train in response to demands for another sight of them after they had embarked for Quebec, where the cross-Canada tour starts officially tomorrow morning. Tonight, the couple and their entourage were aboard their train at an undisclosed, secluded spot somewhere in a French-Canada touched with the russet foliage of Quebec autumn. Decision Re Minimum Potato Price Postponed

It is expected that at least two weeks will elapse before a minimum price for table stock potatoes is established. It was learned last night from Mr. D. A. MacDonald, Manager of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board, who returned from Moncton on Saturday night. The matter was discussed at a joint meeting of the P. E. I. and New Brunswick Potato Marketing Boards on Friday and Saturday, and it was felt that it would be better to withhold a decision until crop conditions and markets were steadier. The members of the two boards also conferred with Rand Matheson, Manager of the Maritime Transportation Commission on the proposed freight rate increases. In effect at present is the 12 per cent increase which the railways received instead of the 20 per cent which was requested. Mr. Matheson wants the opinion of all business interests in the Maritimes, including the two potato boards, before a decision is made in Ottawa in November by the Royal Transportation Commission.

Expect King's Tour Will Be Cancelled

LONDON, Oct. 8 — (AP) — The general expectation here is that the King's Australian tour, set for next year, will be cancelled. A Buckingham Palace spokesman said there is no official statement as yet, and he did not know when one is expected. There is speculation that Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh may go in the place of the King, who is recovering from a serious lung operation. The Sydney Sun said during the week-end in a dispatch from London that the royal visit is definitely off, and that Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh make the trip instead. Prime Minister Sydney Holland of New Zealand, commenting on such published reports, said he had received no information that the plans for the royal tour had been cancelled.

Blue Cross Planning Conference Concludes

Uniform contracts to apply to groups with employees in more than one Province will be put into effect shortly as a result of a decision reached at the annual Directors' meeting of Canada's five Blue Cross Plans held here. The conference ended Sunday after three days of deliberations and resulted in several other decisions being reached. It was announced that there was a "very definite hope" that in the near future special contracts for the dependents of service personnel will be available. "Every effort will be made," said Mr. A. J. Swanson, president of the Council's Governing Board, "to meet the needs of this large and important group." It was also decided to set up immediately a central office for the handling of necessary detail involved in the dissemination of information and statistics relating to a national enrollment. A new slate of officers for the coming year was named at Sunday's session. Mr. J. R. H. Robertson, Montreal, chairman of the Quebec Hospital Service Association, was elected president. Dr. J. A. McMillan, Charlottetown, chairman of the Maritime Hospital Service Association, was named vice president. Other officers elected were Mr. D. W. Ogilvie, executive director of the Plan for Hospital Care, Toronto, as Commissioner for District 12 of the Blue Cross Commission. Miss Ruth Cook Wilson, executive director of the Maritime Hospital Service Association, was named chairman of the Administrative Section. Mr. A. L. Crossin, executive director, Manitoba Hospital Service Association, is the vice chairman of the Administrative Section. Mr. J. A. Monaghan, executive director, Alberta Hospital Service Association, is the honorary secretary of the Administrative Section; and Mr. E. J. Milligan, executive director, Quebec Hospital Service Association, is honorary treasurer.

Blame 10 Deaths On Weather In U.S.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8 — (AP) — Ten persons were killed yesterday as rough weather slammed the United States from the Mississippi valley to the North Atlantic states and eastern seaboard. In the northeast, high winds, thunderstorms and driving rain raised havoc. Topped telephone poles and power lines cut off thousands, particularly around New York City and New Jersey. In New York, heavy rains poured water into subway tubes, interrupting service on several lines in Brooklyn and filling one tunnel with three feet of water. Wind-churned seas threatened craft on the Great Lakes and off the Atlantic coast. Storm warnings went up on all the Great Lakes except the Ontario. Off the eastern coast, the Coast Guard received numerous distress calls from small craft. Seven of the 10 deaths attributed to weather conditions occurred on highways.

Princess' Costume Creates Interest

DORVAL, Que., Oct. 8 — (CP) — Smiling, blue-eyed Princess Elizabeth landed at Montreal airport today wearing a costume adapted to the misty autumn shades which were part and parcel of this morning's autumn weather. Her velvet-collared suit was blue and a turban-type head-piece matched well. The hat was soft felt, off-the-face. Excited women spectators immediately tried to decide whether the Princess' frock was "slate" or "teal" blue. Over the Princess' shoulders was a mint-look, swinging in soft ripples as she walked. She came down the steps from the aircraft smiling brightly, with Prince Philip behind her in the uniform of a Royal Navy officer, and planted her oxford-type tie shoes with Cuban heels firmly on the tarmac. She carried a black calf handbag over her arm. As the royal couple drove slowly past the cheering thousands who jammed Dorval Airport, some 15 miles west of Montreal, spectators could see the gleam of a three-strand pearl necklace at her throat and pearl button ear rings. From one female spectator came the remark: "Look, that skirt has a slit on each side and its the new pencil-slim type." Newspaper men from England said they could never remember the Princess having worn this particular shade of blue. It seemed to merge well with the blue of the uniforms of the Air Force guard of honor when she inspected the airman drawn up stiffly at attention. The Princess' stockings were a copper color, not often worn by Canadian women.

Memorials Unveiled To Distinguished Islanders.

On Sunday afternoon His Honor Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse officiated at the unveiling of monuments at Freetown and Lower Bedeque to two distinguished native sons of Prince Edward Island. Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, director of the Historic Sites and Monuments Board, presided at both functions and gave the dedication speech at the Freetown monument which has been erected to the memory of the late Jacob Gould Schurman. The dedication speech at the monument erected at Lower Bedeque in honor of the late James Colledge Pope was given by Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College. The bronze tablet on the cut-stone monument erected to Jacob Gould Schurman bears the following inscription: "Jacob Gould Schurman, educationalist, author and ambassador, professor at Acadia, Dalhousie and Cornell. President of Cornell University 1892-1921. President of the first United States Philippine Commission. United States Minister to Greece, Montenegro and China and Ambassador to Germany. Born at Freetown, P. E. I., 22 of May, 1854. Died in New York 12th August 1942. Erected by the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada." The bronze tablet on an iron standard erected to James Colledge Pope reads as follows: "James Colledge Pope, merchant shipbuilder and statesman. Thrice premier of Prince Edward Island and Minister of Marine and Fisheries for Canada. Born at Bedeque 11 June, 1826. Died in Summerside, 18 May, 1885. Erected by the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada." (Reports of the addresses delivered at the unveiling ceremonies appear on pages 3 and 13.)

New Trouble For Attlee Gov't Over Oil Issue

LONDON, Oct. 8 — (Reuters) — Prime Minister Attlee and his cabinet were plunged into new trouble over the Iranian oil crisis tonight following publication of a document. According to the Manchester Guardian it suggested that a foreign technician should be appointed as director of the extraction and refining organization of the company. The newspaper's diplomatic correspondent said this clearly did not exclude the appointment of a Briton. The Iranians also proposed the British Government might retain one-half of the price of the oil it purchased toward gradual settlement of compensation for the company, in which it had a controlling interest. The Guardian editorially accused the Foreign Office spokesman of "untruths" when he said Sept. 22 the offer of Sept. 20 would be rejected because it represented no advance on previous offers and adding "rather it even indicates a regression."
