TUESDAY, Sept. 23—General Arthur Wellesley, (afterward Duke of Wellington), gained his first great battle Sept. 23, 1803, with only 4,500 men, though opposed by 53,000.—It is known in military chronicles as the Battle of Assaye (E. India).—General Wellesley entered the Mahratta States on the 8th; took the fort of Ahmednagar; defeated Scindiah and the Rajah of Berar at Assaye, making the enemy fly before him and leave their artillery in his hands.

She entered the church on the arm of her father, and was followed by her maids.—Estela Eaton and two little nieces. Rev. J. Manning performed the ceremony. The bride wore a travelling suit of dark brown trimmed with crushed pumpkin brocade. She wore a hat with brown and crushed pumpkin plumes. The bridesmaid's dress was Duchesse brown trimmed with brocade. The two little misses looked exceedingly pretty, wearing pale blue and pale pink and carrying baskets of flowers. The bride was a member of the choir of the North Baptist church. The happy couple left the church amid the inspiring strains of the wedding march, to go by the W. & A. train on a tour of Canada, and will return to New York and Boston.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPACHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

A Genuine Surprise.

LONDON, Sept. 22. The speakers at the Castlwellan demonstration, yesterday, were William O'Brien, M. P., and Michael Davitt. Davitt tried his auditors to a genuine surprise. He declared that he was second in command of the political army which was invading the Province of Ulster with a fixed purpose and with a confident expectation of victory. The Nationalists had now one great and absorbing desire, as far as the North of Ireland was concerned. That was for political union between the Orangemen and Catholics. Mr. Davitt begged his hearers to lay aside their religious differences of opinion for the sake of the patriotic duty which is incumbent on Orangemen and Catholic alike. Let religion give way for once to patriotism he said, and then only shall we get home rule for Ireland. The audience which was composed almost wholly of Catholics, was taken entirely by surprise at these outspoken advances towards the Orangemen. The crowd raised a cheer for Davitt and union; but most of them stood in mute astonishment.

A New Complication.

LONDON, Sept. 22. A despatch from Shanghai to the Times says:—A new complication has arisen in the Franco-Chinese difficulty. The blockading of the bar at the mouth of Woosung River has been ordered by the Chinese authorities, although a passage for ships of neutrals is to be open. This action is due to the Chinese disbelief in the promises of the French. A veritable panic prevails in Shanghai, and merchants of the neutral powers have asked the naval commanders of those powers to take some action. The British consul has advised Chinese authorities to obtain skilled foreign assistance and keep traffic open. Russian consuls have been ordered to protect French interests wherever the French consuls leave. The Russian fleet in Chinese waters comprise one ironclad, three cruisers, two corvettes, and six gunboats. Three other ironclads are expected to arrive. This strength, in view of the smallness of Russian interests in China, is considered significant.

Fatal Railway Accident.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 23. Two freight trains on the Hannibal and St. Joseph Road collided near New Cambria, Mo., this morning. The trains were wrecked, and three men including the engineer of the West bound train were killed and one other person was fatally injured.

The National Bank.

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Sept. 22. It is stated that the losses of the National Bank of New Jersey will amount to about \$250,000. Cashier Hill's defalcation will probably be over \$200,000, while the balance represents the overdraft of the President. The Bank will reopen on Wednesday next.

A Presentation.

LONDON, Sept. 22. The shareholders in the Loch Line of steamers have presented Captain Jones, of the steamer Loch Garry, with a silver plate and a purse filled with sovereigns, to commemorate the part he bore in the Greeley Relief expedition.

The Cholera.

ROME, Sept. 22. The bulletin of the ravages of cholera in Italy during the past twenty-four hours, shows 409 cases and 226 deaths.
