The Y won the first game of the series 37-33 in Charlottetown more than two weeks ago, Tuesday night.

at Summerside the Airmen came back to defeat the Y 48-37 and win the round by seven points.

The Saints led the league during the regular schedule and drew an automatic bye into the finals.

First game of the final series will be played at Summerside next Monday night. The second game will take place in the S.D.U. gymnasium on Wednesday night and in both games fans are assured of some of the best hoop action of the season.

Saigh To Let Baseball Officials Decide Future

ST. LOUIS, April 23 — (AP) — Fred Saigh, owner of the St. Louis Cardinals, said today he will let baseball's top officials decide whether he should relinquish active control of the club pending settlement of income tax evasion charges against him.

The 46-year-old club owner was indicted by a federal grand jury yesterday on five counts charging he evaded \$49,620 for the years 1946 through 1949.

He expressed confidence today that he will be cleared when all the facts are known. "I can only ask in all fairness that the public withhold final judgment until that time," he said in a prepared statement.

"I shall get in touch with Ford Frick, national commissioner of baseball, and Warren Giles, president of the National League, as soon as possible and outline my views to them," Saigh said.

"I shall be guided completely by their recommendation and judgment as to what I should do personally about active participation in the Cardinals until such time as these charges have been settled after a hearing in the courts."

One possibility is that active direction of the club will be turned over to Bill Walsingham, its vice-president, pending settlement of the tax case against Saigh.

Walsingham, nephew of the late Sam Breadon, Cardinal owner for many years, is the club's most experienced front office man.

The case against Saigh probably won't come to trial for several months. Before arrangements were made for Saigh to surrender on the indictment, his bond was fixed at \$2,000.

Detroit Tigers Vote Confidence In Manager

CHICAGO, April 23 — (AP) — Detroit Tigers at a club house meeting today voted confidence in manager Red Rolfe and denied a published story that they dislike their pilot with "a bitterness that can't help out affect their play."

The story of alleged dissension in the club was written by Gordon Cobbledeik, sports editor of the Cleveland Plain Dealer.

The Tigers have lost eight games in a row and have not won yet this season.

After the meeting pitcher Freddie Hutchinson, spokesman for the players, said: "The story is absolutely untrue. Red has taken the losing streak better than anybody in the club, and he's been fine about everything. All of the players are back of Red one hundred per cent."

Rolfe also told reporters he didn't believe there is any truth in the dissension report.

"When a team is losing, there's bound to be stories of dissension as people try to account for the losing streak," Rolfe said.

"Heck, I know how the players feel toward me and I'm not worried," he added.

Another explanation

DETROIT, April 23 — (AP) — Detroit Tiger players who were disgruntled, hurt and angry at manager Red Rolfe have switched to Rolfe's side—and the switch was prompted by the club's eight-game losing streak.

That's what sports editor Lyall Smith of the Detroit Free Press said today in his daily column, written from Chicago. Smith has been covering the team since spring training began.

"Strange as it may seem, the bad start could turn into an excellent season for a team which two weeks ago was on the verge of rebellion," he wrote.

Smith quoted an unnamed player as saying:

"He (Rolfe) knows what we are going through. He has become one of us. He has done things in this first week when we could do nothing right that has made us admire him and respect him. It is the greatest change in a manager any of us ever has seen."

The Tigers haven't won a game since the American League season opened. The record for most consecutive opening-season defeats is 13.

Umpire Fined In Run-in With Cardinals Manager

CINCINNATI, April 23 — (AP) — Umpire Douglas (Scotty) Robb was fined an undisclosed amount today as a result of a run-in last night with Eddie Stanky, manager of the St. Louis Cards.

Warren C. Giles, new president of the National League, let Stanky off with a \$50 fine, and centered attention on Robb, who was accused of pushing the St. Louis manager.

It was the first time in 13 years that a National League umpire was found guilty of making a mistake. And it set a new policy of announcing such things. In the past, Ford Frick, now baseball commissioner, but for years National League president, did not make public such actions.

The last such situation that was recalled was between umpire George Magerkurth and Billy Jurgens of the New York Giants. That was in July, 1939.

The run-in occurred over the fairness of a home run hit by Harry Craft of Cincinnati, at the Polo Grounds. Because of alleged spitting, Magerkurth was fined and suspended for 10 days. Shortstop Solly Hemus, who started last night's trouble by tossing his bat away when Robb called him out on strikes in the third inning, was fined \$25. Stanky rushed out of the dugout and engaged in a rigorous series of words and gestures with Robb over the decision.

Johnny Carroll To Coach Ball Teams In S'ide

Outfielder Johnny Carroll of Duke University will be the guiding hand behind the Summerside baseball team this summer. It was learned last night from Brooklyn scout Bill O'Connor.

Carroll, who comes from Malden, Mass., was player coach at Glace Bay two years ago when that team won Nova Scotia baseball honors. He is about 25 or 26 years of age.

Johnny is regarded as a top notch ball player. At the age of 19 when he graduated from High School he was offered a contract with the Brooklyn organization but turned it down in order to go to college.

Carroll is a veteran of two years in the United States Army having seen service in the Pacific. He is a member of the Duke Varsity team and will graduate from the University this spring.

At Summerside he will take over from "Chick" Whelan who coached the ball teams in the western capital last year. "Chick" is now flying in Korea with the U. S. Marine Air Corps.

O'Flaherty Hopes Beavers Will Get Break Tonight

QUEBEC, April 23 — (CP) — Saint John Beavers, trailing by three games in the final series for the Alexander Trophy, hope for a "break" when they meet Quebec Aces tomorrow night in the fourth clash.

Playing coach John (Peanut) O'Flaherty said Beavers will be rested and "should click."

Neither the Maritimes Major Hockey League nor the Quebec Senior Loop champions practised today, although some Aces went out for a light skating session on their home rink.

Coach Punch Imlach of Aces was beaming at the prospect of taking the trophy in four straight victories. "Beavers are on the spot and Aces have the psychological edge," he said. "It'll be a do-or-die game for Saint John."

Imlach said Beavers were a fast-skating club, but Aces were heavier.

"If we get the first goal, it'll be tough going for the Beavers."

He planned no changes in the line-up. Goalie Jack Gellineau, former Boston Bruins player in the National League, will be in the nets again after his noteworthy performance in the previous games.

Aces beat Saint John 4-2 Tuesday night, but only after the play saw-sawed from the start. The Quebec club had the edge in play over Beavers who were at their 107th game, including a 90-game regular season. The Q.S.H.L. season is 60 games.

Quebec won the first two games in the New Brunswick city 4-1 and 5-3.

Earl Alexander Makes Maiden Speech In Lords

LONDON, April 23 — (CP) — Field Marshal Earl Alexander of Tunis, in a maiden speech, told the House of Lords today Britain's contribution to defence of the free world is second only to that of the United States, but said the country must endure an "uncomfortable period of anxiety" before it can feel safe.

In the current year, Britain's new defence minister told a crowded chamber, defence expenditure is expected to absorb more than one-tenth of the country's gross output of goods and services. Some eight per cent of the population would be directly employed in defence work, including more than 850,000 men and women with the armed forces.

Lord Alexander said Britain had to fight a cold war while trying to build up strength for a possible hot war — which involved problems ranging from full-scale military operations in Korea and Malaya to the economics of defence and the need to counter the jamming of overseas propaganda broadcasts.

In a general review, he said the recent departure of two British army divisions overseas left the country in a state of extreme nakedness.

"The cold war commitments have for the time being, detoured us of a strategic reserve in the United Kingdom, and have made it more difficult for us to do what we should wish in fields of manpower, research and development in preparing against a possible hot war."

He expressed hope that deliveries would start next year of the Sabre fighter aircraft which Canada and the United States were to make available to Britain.

The Defence Minister spoke in debate opened by his namesake, Viscount Alexander of Hillsborough, who said he felt a civilian should have been appointed to the defence post.

Wanted To Observe Victoria Day On Nearest Monday

OTTAWA, April 23 — (CP) — The Commons, after a lot of arguing and amending, last night agreed in principle to a bill that Canada should celebrate Victoria Day on the Monday preceding May 24, effective in 1953.

Effective May 24 itself has always been a statutory holiday.

Next year May 24 falls on a Sunday. Should the measure become effective, it would make Monday May 18, 1953, a holiday. In 1954 May 24 falls on a Monday.

This possibility came about as a result of a bill introduced by J.L. MacDougall (L—Vancouver—Burnaby).

In the original form the bill also would have changed celebration of Dominion Day from July 1 to the first Monday following that day.

However, E.D. Fulton (PC—Kamloops) objected. He thought celebration of a significant date such as the day Canada became a nation should not be changed so people could have a long week-end.

The measure would have celebrated Victoria Day on Monday immediately following May 24. But Gordon Graydon (PC—Peele) thought this was too close to June 9, when Canada will celebrate the birth of Queen Elizabeth. The Queen's birthday actually is April 21. It is celebrated in Britain on June 5.

He moved, and his amendment was accepted, that Victoria Day be celebrated on the Monday preceding May 24, even though it would move the celebration a week ahead of May 24 next year.

Stallion Enrolment

According to the provisions of the Stallion Enrolment Act all stallions two years old and over, standing for service in this Province, must be enrolled in the records of the Department of Agriculture. Horses offering for service must be inspected and graded and carry an inspection certificate. Applications for enrolment and inspection should be made immediately.

Applications for enrolment should be accompanied with the required fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00) and should include name of horse, breed, age, colour description and registration number, if horse is registered.

Stallion owners who use horses for service not enrolled or inspected, or in grades not authorized by the Act will be subject to the penalty provisions of the Act. Only horses enrolled, graded and authorized by the Department of Agriculture will be permitted to travel for public service. All horses that have graded "out" will not be permitted to stand or travel for service.

Rocky Marciano Gets 3-Month Suspension

AUGUSTA, Me., April 23 — (AP) — The Maine Boxing Commission tonight suspended heavyweight title contender Rocky Marciano of Brockton, Mass., for 30 days, starting May 13, for "deception" during a Maine exhibition tour.

The suspension, ordered after a public hearing today, is effective in every state except New York, the commission said.

The commission took its action because Marciano's youngster brother, Louis Marchegiano, 18-year-old Brockton high school athlete, sparred with Rocky in the exhibitions under the names of Pete Fuller and Tony Zullo.

"Pete Fuller" had been identified in newspaper publicity before the bouts as an outstanding Boston amateur heavyweight, son of former Governor Alvan T. Fuller of Massachusetts.

The commission said all the other 46 states who are members of the National Boxing Association would impose the suspension automatically.

It also barred Lewiston fight bookers Sam Michael and John B. Rogers from all ring activity for six months for their part in Marciano's tour. Rocky's brother Louis escaped any "punitive action."

The commission said the U.S. Amateur Athletic Union would bar Louis from amateur boxing for five years, however.

The action leaves Marciano free to fulfill an agreement to fight Bernie Reynolds May 12 in Providence, R. I., a bout which was contracted for before the hearing, the commission said.

Bobby Cain Outpitches Feller In Unique Duel As Browns Whip Indians

Bobby Cain outpitched Bob Feller last night in a unique duel in which the upstart St. Louis Browns whipped the Cleveland Indians 3 to 0, and took over first place in the American League race.

Feller, like Cain, allowed only one hit, but the safety of the Cleveland veteran was a first-inning triple by Bobby Young, good for a run, whereas the only hit off Cain's delivery was a harmless single by Luke Easter in the fifth inning.

Young's triple opened the Browns' first inning and when third baseman Al Rosen fumbled Marty Marion's grounder, Young scored the only run of the game.

It was Feller's 11th one-hit game and the only one-hitter he ever had. The game was played in a 50 degree chill at St. Louis, before 7,110 shivering and delighted fans.

In the other American League game, played in the afternoon, rubber-armed Ellis Kinder made one of his infrequent starts and led the rookie-studded Boston Red Sox to a 3-1, five-hit triumph over the seasoned New York Yankees.

Kinder, who has thrived as a relief pitcher the past few seasons, walked six and fanned five in besting Allie (No-Hit) Reynolds at Boston's Fenway Park before 15,336 fans.

The Red Sox' kids took charge of Boston's offense. Youngsters Jim Piersall, Ted Lepcio and Sam White accounted for six of Boston's eight

hits and drove in two of the three runs. Piersall collected two doubles, Lepcio chipped in with a double and home run and White contributed a triple and single.

New York scored its lone run in the fourth inning on an infield hit, Texas League single and Gene Woodling's double play grounder.

The New York Giants outslugged the Boston Braves, 9-5, in the majors' only other day game.

Home runs by Al Dark, Don Muller, West Westrum and relief pitcher Hoyt Wilhelm featured the Giant victory. Rookie Ed Matthews potted a two-run homer off Wilhelm in the sixth.

Towering Gene Conley started for Boston and was shelled from the mound in the fourth after yielding homers to Dark, Mueller and Westrum. Dick Hoover took over and Wilhelm greeted him with a homer.

Lefty Roger Bowman opened for New York. Wilhelm came in and lingered until the eighth when Dave Koslo took over with two out and two aboard. Koslo got pinch-hitter George Crowe to ground out and bled the Braves in the ninth to preserve the decision for Wilhelm.

Scheduled games between the St. Louis Cardinals and Cincinnati, Brooklyn and Philadelphia, Detroit and Chicago and Washington and Philadelphia were postponed because of rain. Pittsburgh and Chicago were idle.
