## Spud Marketing Plan Depending On Orders

Agriculture Minister Andrew B. MacRae and representatives of the P.E.I. Marketing Board and the potato industry met in Moncton yesterday afternoon with S. B. Williams of the Canada department of agriculture, and representatives of the New Brunswick potato industry.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss details of the federal government's offer to assist in the reduction of large stocks of Maritime potatoes. It was announced in Ottawa Thursday that the federal government has authorized aid to move potatoes to non-North American markets.

The aid is to be provided by the agricultural stabilization board and will take the form of direct payments to producers sufficient to guarantee a return of \$1.45 for each graded 165-

pound barrel of No. 1 potatoes loaded on cars. Mr. MacRae said last night that nothing could be finalized until the end of the week in order to find out how much of an order these outside markets would want, if any.

He said that at that time it should be known how much of an order would be shipped from this province. The agriculture minister said earlier in the day that the offer of aid could mean that this province will be able to reduce its potato stocks by as much as 200 carloads.

## ALBERTON BLAZE SEEN FOR MILES

Two disastrous fires occurred in Western Prince County on Thursday. During the morning in O'Leary, Mrs. Clarence Johnson, 92, and her daughter, Lottie Johnson, 63, died as the result of a fire that destroyed their home. Lee MacWilliams, also a

resident in the house is a patient in the Community Hospital where his condition was described last night as showing improvement. Thursday night the home of Dr. and Mrs. O. H. Phillips at Alberton was destroyed in a blaze that was seen for miles,

as shown above. Some furniture including a television set, and five pieces of dentistry equipment was all that was saved from the large, well furnished home. Workmen were repairing the furnace when the fire broke out in the basement.

## Plumber Says His Equipment Not At Fault

**SUMMERSIDE** — Alton Gaudet, Summerside plumbing and heating contractor, told the Guardian yesterday that the fire which resulted in the destruction of the residence of Dr. O.H. Phillips at Alberton on Thursday night was not the result of equipment he was using.

He stressed that the blow torch he had owned and used had not been lit anytime during the day or evening. He explained that he had been within an hour of completing the plumbing and heating work that would have enabled the heating system to be turned on in the residence.

He said he had been expecting a phone call from his wife in Summerside and when the phone rang he had gone upstairs to answer it. Just before he started back downstairs a portable oil heater being used by another in the basement apparently went wild and fire spread, flaming up and igniting the overhead flooring, forcing them out of the basement.

He said the flames must have damaged power wires because the phone was inoperative when he tried to summon the fire department, and it was necessary for a call to be made from a nearby residence. In the fire Mr. Gaudet lost \$200 worth of plumbing and heating tools, and a jacket containing a purse with about \$125 in cash.

## Johansson Loses To U.S. Court

**MIAMI, Fla. (AP)** — Ingemar Johansson, Swedish heavyweight fighter, lost another round in federal court Friday in his attempt to escape paying income taxes the government claims he owes.

U.S. district Judge Frank M. Johnson Jr. denied motions by Johansson's attorneys for a new trial. Johansson claims he is a resident of Switzerland and therefore is exempt from U.S. taxes. Funds from his fights with Floyd Patterson have been tied up since last March when Patterson knocked out the Swede.

## CN Testing New Type 'Reefer' For Better Cooling System

**MONCTON** — A new car that may well prove a boon to Atlantic provinces farmers, dairy producers and fishermen is being tested by Canadian National Railways.

It features the first door-mounted mechanical refrigeration system in North America, and may eventually replace the present ice-refrigerated cars. The cars provide a "semi-envelope" cooling system. The cool air goes down side-wall ducts in the car instead of passing through the load, thereby reducing dehydration. It gives an even temperature distribution to within two degrees in a 28 to 70 degree Fahrenheit range.

Canadian National tested a prototype car in the fall of 1960. It was so reliable that 10 other refrigerator units were converted.

The cars are now being tested across the CN system carrying loads of beef, dairy products, fresh vegetables and fruit. They have yet to see full service during summer months, however. They could be used to haul such commodities as Prince Edward Island potatoes, Nova Scotia apples, Maritime fish catches.
