

EUROPEAN POLITICS.

Although the flying rumors telegraphed across the Atlantic the other day about the probable outbreak of hostilities in the East, the speedy return of the Prince of Wales from India, and the proposed abdication of the Queen, were evidently more sensational reports, yet there are many real causes for anxiety in the present state of Europe.

As is well known, there has been for some time past an insurrection of the Christian inhabitants of the province of Herzegovina. This province, situated in the western part of Turkey in Europe, near the Adriatic coast, has been part of the Turkish Empire since the year 1697.

So, a few weeks ago, Turkish bondholders, of whom there are a great many in England, received an unpleasant notification, to the effect that they were to receive only half their interest—in other words, that Turkey had gone into bankruptcy and offered her creditors fifty cents in the dollar of the interest of their claims.
