

German Agricultural Methods.

The latest published reports of the United States consuls on agriculture in Germany call the attention of the systematic farmer and economic way of the German farmer. The lesson which has constantly to be studied by the German farmer is how to produce much upon a small area. During recent years the value of chemistry in farming has been more and more insisted upon in Germany; so much so indeed that the imperial government encourages with generous assistance the establishment and maintenance in different parts of the country of agricultural and technical schools of a high order. Small farms, when cultivated with intelligence, are shown to have produced the best average results. Attention is directed by the report upon the Prussian farmer to the case of two farms situated side by side, one containing ten and the other twenty acres. The families upon each farm were composed of three adult persons and children. The owner of the ten-acre farm managed to secure from it comfortable living for himself and family. The owner of the twenty-acre farm, with double the investment in land, accomplished only the same general result. The owner of the ten-acre farm worked with his head as well as his hands, hence the difference in achievement.
