On ne saurait concevoir une plus heureuse idée. M. Whelan a été un des hommes les plus éminents, non seulement de cette province, mais de tout le Canada. Comme orateur, journaliste et homme d'Etat il a été l'honneur de son pays. Nous souhaitons à M. Monaghan le plus grand succès dans sa mission.

Notre compatriote et jeune député M. J. F. Arsenault de Wellington a droit aux plus chaleureuses félicitations pour son esprit d'entreprise. M. Arsenault fait un commerce sur une grande échelle et s'est acquis par ses bonnes qualités et son esprit d'initiative une position qui le place au premier rang dans le monde commercial. Dans quelques semaines, il occupera son nouveau magasin, magnifique établissement de 85 pieds de longueur, fini dans tous les goûts de l'art moderne. Succès à notre vaillant et énergique compatriote.

Nous avons eu le mariage à bicyclette, et les journaux ont conté en termes plaisants l'aventure de ces jeunes gens qui, le jour de leur mariage, n'ont abandonné leur selle que pour recevoir la bénédiction nuptiale.
