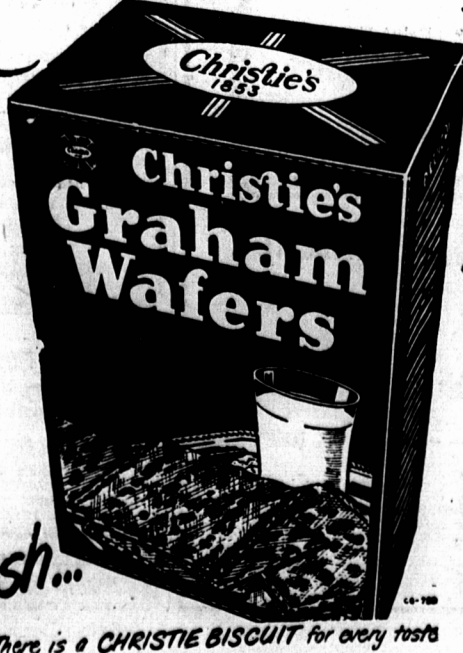
### HIGHFIELD W. A.

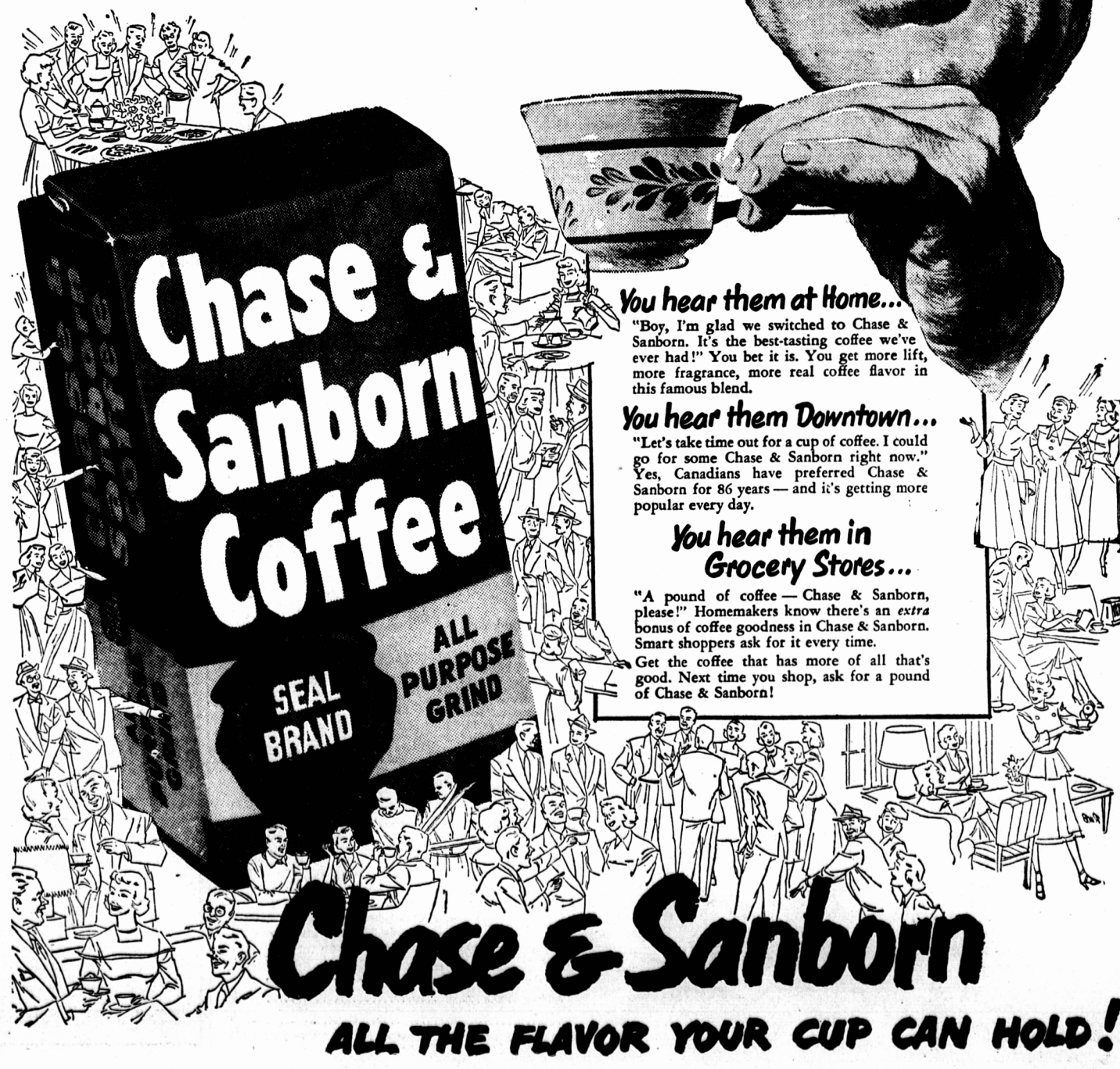
