Local and Other Items

SIGNS OF THE TIMES.—It is said that more than 40 per cent of the British people could not write their names when the Queen ascended the throne. The proportion in that condition now has been reduced to 7 per cent.

IN GRIP'S GRIP.—An epidemic of the grip is spreading in New York. There are thousands of mild cases, and the doctors attribute it largely to the filthy condition of the streets. New York evidently misses Col. Waring.

HE WAS PENNILESS.—Harold Frederic, it seems, had plenty of brilliance, but no thrift. He died penniless, even the copyrights of his novels being heavily mortgaged. A fund has been started for his widow and children, who are left without resources.

SABLE ISLAND WEALTH.—The popular idea of Sable Island is that it is a barren sandbar almost incapable of supporting life. In this connection it may be interesting to know that \$1,700 worth of cranberries have been gathered there during the past season.

SALE OF FAST ONES.—Phenol, 2,071, the noted packing mare, was put up at auction last week at the Spann & Negassale, Chicago, and was sold to J. W. Marks, the owner of Joe Patchen. Marks paid \$1,250 for Phenol and got a bargain. Ed. Patchen, two-year-old son of Joe Patchen went for \$135, Jim D. and Joe Pointer were knocked down for \$200 and \$110 respectively. About sixty horses were sold, the average price being \$320.

THE CHAPLAIN SUCCEMBED.—A marriage in Australia took place recently under peculiar circumstances. A young man used to receive nice letters from his young sister, which he sometimes showed to his friend, a chaplain; he also showed him her photograph. The chaplain became captivated, and asked if the sister could not be persuaded to come out, and he wrote and proposed to her. In the course of time an acceptance arrived, and when the vessel was expected by which the sister was to arrive the brother and the chaplain got leave to go and meet her, but when the brother saw who had come he exclaimed in despair: "It's Maria!" Not the pretty young sister, but one one twenty years older. But as she had come so far the chaplain did not like to ship her back again, and so succumbed to his fate.

RAILWAY TIME TABLE.—The winter arrangement of trains on the Island railway went into effect yesterday. The morning train will leave Charlottetown at 7 o'clock, the train to reach Summerside at 9:30, to depart at 12:50, and reach Tignish at 5:30. The Tignish train will leave there at 6 a.m. arriving at Summerside at 10:30, departing will leave Summerside at 12 o'clock, arriving in Charlottetown at 2:30. The accommodation train will leave Charlottetown at 3:10 arriving at Summerside at 6:20. The morning train will leave Summerside at 7 o'clock, arriving at Charlottetown at 10:20. The eastern train will leave Charlottetown at 2:30; the branch train to leave Mount Stewart at 4:05 and arrive at Souris at 6:40. Proceeding, the eastern train will leave Mt. Stewart at 4:10, arriving at Georgetown at 5:45. The morning train will leave Georgetown at 7:10, arriving at Charlottetown at 10:30. The morning train from Souris will leave there at 6:20, connecting at Mt. Stewart at 8:55 with the train from Georgetown to Charlottetown. The Capes train will leave Emerald at 5:15 p.m., arriving at Cape Traverse at 6:05, returning next morning it will leave Cape Traverse arriving at Emerald at 7:50. The above hours are all standard time.

ANOTHER LUTEGERT CASE

A Chicago Cook Kills His Wife to Obtain Money.

CHICAGO, Dec. 20.—Further interesting developments in the case of Michael Rollinger, the big Austrian, who is under arrest charged with murdering and partly cremating his wife, have disclosed another woman in the case. When Rollinger some time ago was a cook in a Randolph street restaurant it is said he became enamored of a waitress named Lena. This woman was afterwards, and until a few days previous to the tragedy, employed in Rollinger's restaurant on Milwaukee avenue, and is now supposed to be in Michigan. The police are trying to locate her. It develops that two days before Mrs. Rollinger so mysteriously disappeared she told a friend that her husband had threatened to kill her unless she left within ten days. It has also been discovered that before the fire Rollinger left in a nearby saloon a valise containing an insurance policy on Mrs. Rollinger's life for \$300 and deeds for \$8,000 worth of property in Austria, which belonged to her. The police comment on the similarity of the case to that of the Lutegert murder. They have arrived at the conclusion that Rollinger murdered his wife in order to get possession of her property and marry the other woman.

Big Passenger List.

MONTREAL, Dec. 22.—The Beaver line steamship Lake Huron, which sailed for St. John, N. B., from Batoum on December 16, has on board 1,822 persons. In charge of the party, according to the Canadian Gazette, is Count Serge Tolstoi, son of the world-famous idealist and author, Count Tolstoi. Mr. Sculergitzky, whose name is now familiar in connection with this movement, will conduct the party on board the steamship Lake Superior, the next steamer. The party of Doak-hobors will proceed directly from St. John to Winnipeg.

A sensation has been caused in Berlin by disciplinary proceedings being instituted against Prof. Delbrück in the Berlin University. He published an article vehemently criticizing the expulsion of the Schlesweg.
