Japanese Women's Status is Improving

The status of women has undergone a good deal of improvement in Japan since the Second World War. Miss Kinako Saito, public prosecutor, Yokohama district, Japan, said in an interview here Thursday.

Miss Saito, touring Canada on a United Nations Fellowship, is making a study of Canadian criminal procedure and probation system. She spent this week in Prince Edward Island and left yesterday for Montreal.

In actual practice however, she noted, matters are a bit different. The ingrained social conservatism in Japan, as a rule women cannot rise to the top of a profession or get as high positions in business.

Women should engage in work according to their particular abilities, she said, but she should also live as a woman and marry. Miss Saito stated that if she should marry she would continue with her profession.

ARRANGED MARRIAGES
The social custom of arranged marriages is still quite prevalent in Japan, she said. This makes "real" marriages, and, added, considering Japanese social customs there is not that much opportunity for people to meet and marry. Although, in some cases, this is difficult to enforce.

Except among middle aged women and on ceremonial occasions, western dress has replaced the kimono. Fashions by French, Italian and American designers are available.
