

W. I. Course In Leadership Opens

The problem of tooth decay among school children was the subject of much discussion at the Women's Institute Leadership Course which opened yesterday in Charlottetown.

One suggestion which was offered at the well attended afternoon session was that citrus fruit juices should be sold in small, individual containers for children who take their lunches to school, and thus prevent the purchasing of soft drinks. It was decided that a resolution be drawn up to this effect for presentation to the Dominion organization in the hope that manufacturers of citrus fruit juices could be persuaded to use 4 oz. containers.

The afternoon session opened with a discussion on "School Lunches," led by Mrs. Julian Herring, with Mrs. Murdoch MacGowan speaking on the need of the serving of one hot dish to the children who stayed at school for their lunch.

Mrs. M. J. Doyle spoke on the necessity of co-operating with the younger members of the communities in their projects for community betterment and Miss M. Robin dealt briefly with the need of improvements to community cemeteries, and suggested that a project of this type could be spread over a number of years.

In the absence of Mrs. Ramsey, Convenor of Agriculture, Miss Robin presented her report on "Gardens for the Community," and suggested competitions for the best vegetable garden in the district as one way to induce children to eat a greater variety of vegetables. Fund raising projects were the subject of a discussion led by Mrs. Harold Laird, during which many novel and informative ideas were suggested for raising money in the various districts.

Mrs. W. E. MacKinnon led a discussion on projects for other organizations and stated that W. I. secretaries received 22 different requests this year either to canvass for funds or for donations from the local Institute. It was suggested that all money for charity be allocated at one time, or that

one organization a year be selected for active support.

Describes Visit

During the evening session Mr. Walter R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture was the guest speaker, and spoke on his visit to the International Food Producers' Conference in Europe last Summer. He recounted many interesting experiences and told of the international understanding which was created by meetings of that kind.

Members were pleasantly entertained during the evening with vocal solos by Miss Maureen Blake, accompanied by Miss Bethany MacDonald.



Says Chignecto Canal Project Not Justified

OTTAWA, March 15 (CP)—Construction of a ship canal across the isthmus of Chignecto in the Maritimes was viewed unfavorably by the Royal Commission on Transportation in its report tabled in Parliament today.

The commission said it could not recommend that the Federal Government build the canal to link the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Bay of Fundy, which it estimated to cost at least \$100,000,000.

The project would call for an 18-mile cut across the isthmus at the Nova Scotia-New Brunswick border, affording an all-inland route down the Atlantic coast. It has been urged for many years by some Maritime communities and organizations, both as a peacetime development project and as a defence measure.

The commission, noting that reports of some commissions before 1931 had favored the canal, said conditions had changed vastly since then. Traffic in the area now moved by trucks, which were not a factor at the time of previous reports.

Household Finance Elects Officers

There is certainly not sufficient evidence to justify the commission in recommending a capital expenditure of at least \$100,000,000 with annual charges in the neighborhood of \$4,500,000, more especially as a canal so constructed might be too small for certain types of traffic," it said.

Responding to argument that federal canal construction in Central Canada set a precedent for the Maritime project, the commission said:

"The proposed Chignecto canal cannot be compared with canals such as those which exist in the Great Lakes, where there is no alternative form of water transportation and where traffic is of great volume."

During the commission's inquiry, the governments of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island recommended the Chignecto construction. Later, a big Maritime delegation travelled to Ottawa and laid the case for the canal before cabinet at a public hearing.

Prime Minister St. Laurent advised the delegation the government was turning the inquiry over to the royal commission. That body had concluded its inquiry by then, but it made new studies, leading up to its report on the question.

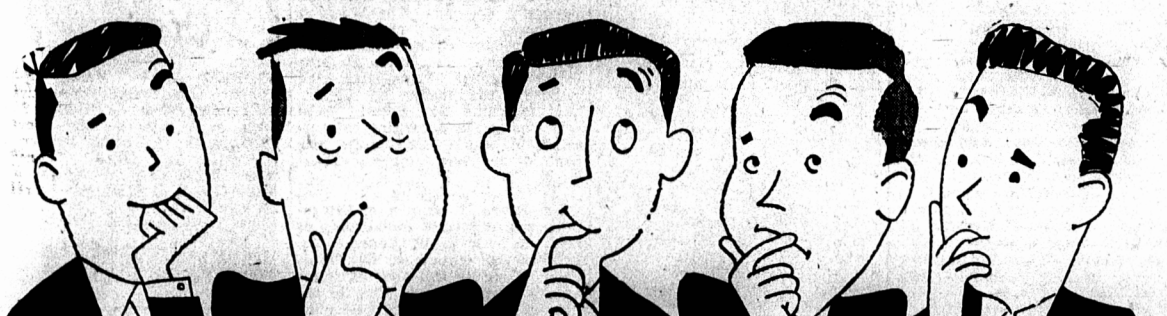
IMPORTED HOUNDS


