**Salvation Army Leaders To Conduct Local Rally**

Here to conduct a special evangelistic rally Tuesday will be Commissioner and Mrs. W. Wycliffe Booth. Commissioner Booth is the newly appointed Salvation Army leader in Canada and Bermuda. Present also for the occasion will be Brigadier and Mrs. William Walton, New Brunswick Division and Major and Mrs. Arnold Brown from territorial headquarters in Toronto.

Commissioner Booth is a grandson of the Army's founder and first General, William Booth and the second son of the Salvation Army's second General, Bramwell Booth. His mother, Mrs. General Booth, still lives in the family cottage at High Barnet, England. She has an active interest in Army affairs although over 90 years of age. Wycliffe Booth entered the work of the Salvation Army in 1916. He married Captain Renee Peyron whose father and mother were territorial leaders of the Army in France. The Booths have five children, four of whom are Salvation Army officers. The youngest, Renee-Blanche, 16, has accompanied her parents to Canada. Two other members of the Booth family have preceded him as leaders of the Salvation Army in Canada: an uncle Commandant Herbert Booth and an aunt, Commander Evangeline Booth are both well known to thousands of Canadians.

Mrs. Booth has given outstanding leadership in Women's Social Service work, and has been interested in such ventures as a home for retired slum officers and special work on behalf of the blind, deaf and dumb of Norway. As a girl she assisted her parents in the establishment of the Salvation Army in France. Major Arnold Brown was born in London, England. He received his training from the Salvation Army's Training College at Belleville, Ontario and served as a field officer at Bowmanville, Ontario before being transferred to territorial headquarters at Toronto. He is known as a bandmaster, choral conductor, composer and arranger. He studied music with Trinity College of London and devotes a good deal of time to musical pursuits. **SHARED TREASURE**

**Thoughts For Our Time**

**ONLY ONE ROAD LEADS TO UNION WITH CREATOR**

Our Lord once spoke these words to His disciples: "I have come that they may have life, and may have it more abundantly." What is life, anyway? And what is this life that Jesus is offering us in ever-increasing measure? One thing that we associate with life is movement. When we say that someone has lots of life, we mean that he is quick in his actions, and never seems to be still. It is with the same notion in mind that we speak of a tune as lively. But movement is not the only important aspect of life. There can be plenty of movement in things which have no life at all. Take a cogwheel in a well-oiled machine, for instance. It may be revolving hundreds of times every minute, and yet we would never think of attributing life to it. What is lacking in the rapid motion of that wheel, which is not lacking in the imperceptible creeping of the vine outside my window? The cogwheel is moving because it is being forced to move—its rotation is a purely passive thing; whereas my vine enjoys a certain spontaneity—it is active in its own RIGHT. It is not just moving—it is moving itself.

My vine, further, is accomplishing something for itself—it is perfecting itself—it is realizing within itself more and more of the things of which it is capable. Its inner growth, its sprouting of leaves to get more benefit from the sun's rays, the grip of its tentacles on my window screen, its breathing—by all of these movements, my vine is achieving for itself a higher degree of perfection.

**SELF-PERFECTING**

To summarize what we have said so far, let us say, first, that life is betrayed by activity. Secondly, this activity is spontaneous, having its source within the living being. Thirdly, this activity is self-perfecting; it is directed toward an end. Of course, it was to us men that our Lord promised an ever-more-abundant life, rather than the lower creatures; so let us turn now to consider what this life is in us.

As in the other material creatures, life in us is betrayed by our activity. But our activity has a spontaneity which is a much more splendid thing than the spontaneity of the lower creatures. We are much more truly

the cause of our movements—we are much more truly responsible for what we do. The faculties which enable us to live a so-much fuller life are our intellect and will. Through them, we are able to know the immaterial and spiritual God which it is our end to possess, and we are able to love That God and choose to freely, and also to choose freely the means by which we are to attain it. We are "the captains of our souls."

**ONE ROAD TO UNION**

There is only one road for us to union with God, our supreme Good, and that road is Christ, Who called Himself "the Way." Without Christ, our activities are aimless and purposeless, for their very source in us is damaged by the fall of Adam—the intellect is darkened and unable to know God, our end, properly; and the will is unable, by itself, to restore the bond of friendship with God which it has broken by an infinitely grievous offense. As our Lord said, "Without Me, you can do nothing."

However, on the coming of the God-man into the world, we men have been enlightened again concerning the Good Who is our end. For one thing, He has told us much about Himself, and about the Father and the Holy Ghost, which we could never otherwise have known. But even more important, He has let men live with Him and learn to love Him, and thereby gain a knowledge of Him which is truly deep and intimate.

Also, the breach which Adam's insult created between man and God was sealed in the only way in which it could fittingly be done, by the sacrifice of infinite atonement made by the God-man. Because of Christ, then, the divine life can again fill our souls and aim our lives toward the Goal, the God, for Whom our hearts are made.

But let us not be presumptuous. This influence of Christ's does not move us like cogs in a machine—we are not simply passive to it. It is life which He gives us, not mere movement. He gives us the life—we must live it. We must move ourselves, spontaneously, generously, toward the perfection and the Goal which has been set up for us. God, through His Son, offers us the challenge of life. May we answer it courageously, generously, and joyfully.
