FIRE ALARM.—Last night about 9 p. m. the fire alarm was sounded for a fire at the Provincial Building. The cause of the outbreak was some burning on the Richmond Street side of the building which had evidently been wrapped around an exposed wire. There was a spectacular blaze, but it was speedily extinguished, when Mr. Jas. Brown climbed a ladder and cut the wire. There was no damage done.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—Master Caldwell Brown, the little three-year-old son of Mr. Pictou C. Brown, met with a painful accident yesterday afternoon. While driving with his father and sitting with him on the front seat the steering gear suddenly went wrong, turning the car to the side of the street and bringing it into collision with a telegraph pole. The little fellow was thrown forward, his head striking the windshield and receiving a bad cut which necessitated some stitches to close. Fortunately the car was going slowly at the time, otherwise the accident might have been more serious. There were a number of other children in the car on the rear seat, but none of them was hurt.

OLD VETERAN ON DUTY.—In connection with the firing of the salute in honor of the Prince of Wales it was interesting to notice an Island veteran of former days on duty with the firing squad—Sergeant-Major John Hartz, who attended to the opening of the cases of ammunition. Sergt. Major Hartz wearing the old familiar uniform of the Canadian Artillery, which has been superseded today by Khaki, looked as smart and soldierly as he did twenty years ago. He had the honor to be attached as "Powder Monkey" to the military squad which fired the salute here when the present Prince of Wales' grandfather, afterwards King Edward VII., landed in Charlottetown. Sergt. Major Hartz was only 13 or 14 years of age at the time but remembers everything in connection with that memorable event distinctly. It is worthy of note to say that he has assisted at every salute fired since upon the occasion of visits of royalty to Charlottetown.

VISIT TO FOX RANCH.—Mr. Ernest Cotes, representing Reuters' Limited, of London, on the present Royal visit, enjoyed during his short stay in Charlottetown, his first visit to a fox ranch. Having expressed a desire to see some of the famous Prince Edward Island foxes in their man-made homes, and being unaware of the Prince was to visit a ranch. Mr. A. E. Morrison, Manager of the Anglo-American Telegraph Co., kindly offered to drive him to Mr. J. R. Rombough's ranch, an offer gratefully accepted. Accompanied by several others, Mr. Cotes was shown by Mr. Rombough through his splendid ranch, the process of feeding and caring for the foxes, and indeed the history of fox breeding most intelligently explained. A number of cured silver skins were also shown Mr. Cotes, who was greatly interested in all that he saw and learned of the great fox farming industry. A gift by Mr. Rombough of photographs of the ranch and of some of its most famous foxes was also very much appreciated by Mr. Cotes who expressed his surprise at the greatness and the possibilities of the industry as well as the pleasure afforded him of seeing the magnificent animals in their ranch.

TEACHERS AND THEIR SALARIES

Three Months Hoist.

A special meeting of the P. E. I. Teachers' Union was held in the St. Dunstan's Parish Hall on Tuesday afternoon to consider action to be taken regarding the proposed strike for higher salaries. There was a large and representative gathering presided over by the President, Mr. Francis. Six Liberal members of the Legislature were present, and appeals were made by Mr. Bell, Mr. Johnston and Mr. Nash, to give the new government time to see what they can do in the matter. It was resolved after discussion to postpone the strike for three months to give Mr. Bell and his colleagues time to find ways and means of complying with the teachers' wishes. The following resolutions were passed:—

(1) "Whereas the Educational Referendum recently taken has shown an adverse verdict; and whereas, a change of government has taken place since the passing of the last strike resolution, (May 17, 1919); Therefore Resolved, that the time of strike called for by the last resolution (mentioned above) be extended.

"Further resolved, that a strike of all teachers not receiving the minimum supplement asked for by the Union, or a total salary equivalent to that to which such supplement would raise the present salaries, take place on a day exactly three months after the incoming Government assumes office.

"Further resolved, that if a settlement is not arrived at within two weeks after the date set forth in the previous article that all other teachers shall 'stand out' in sympathy. "Further resolved, that in case a settlement is not arrived at the aforementioned dates, thus necessitating a strike, that the teachers be recouped by the Government or the Districts or both, as shall be agreed upon, for time lost, before teachers return to work."

(2) "Whereas the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Union has suffered a distinct loss in the death of one of the most energetic members of the Union Executive, namely, Mr. A. B. Campbell; and whereas, the sympathy of the teachers goes out to the family of the late Mr. Campbell, in their sad bereavement; Therefore resolved, that we place on record our appreciation of the services which the late Mr. Campbell rendered to the cause of education in his capacity as a member of the Teachers' Union;

"Further resolved, that the sincere sympathy of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Union be tendered to the family of the late Mr. Campbell; "Further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the family of the late Mr. Campbell, and also a copy be sent to the press for publication."

(3) "Resolved that the Teachers' Union in special session assembled urgently request the Department of Education not to grant permits to teach to persons who have not passed the examinations for teachers' licenses.

(4) Resolved that the Executive of the Teachers' Union present to the annual convention to be held Exhibition Week, recommendations in reference to the matter of Teachers' salaries."

Jugo-Slavs Awarded Disputed Territory

(Special to the Guardian) PARIS, August 20.—The French Minister at Belgrade has informed the Jugo Slav Government that the Peace Conference has awarded it the Predmura territory, according to a Belgrade despatch by the Temps. The notification was given the Belgrade Government upon instructions from Premier Clemenceau and included the authorization for the immediate occupation of the district by Jugo-Slav troops.

U. S. Government To Fix Food Prices

(Special to the Guardian) (WASHINGTON, August 20)—Immediate Government price fixing of all commodities as the only effective way of stopping profiteering and reducing the cost of living is contained in amendments to the Federal Food Control Act, when representative Haugen (Iowa), Chairman of the

House Agricultural Committee, intends to push through the House this week Mr. Haugen's amendments which were framed after conferences with Department of Justice officials, provide for the proclamation of fair prices on all necessities by the President and give the Department of Justice direct powers to prosecute anyone charging
