IN LOCK.—A woman named Peterson, who formerly worked in Gibson's cotton factory, Marvillville, and recently was engaged as housekeeper with a Mr. White in that village, has inherited property of \$20,000 value from a relative in New York.

TO BUILD ELECTRIC RAILWAYS.—A project is on foot to run an electric railway from Hazel Hill to Canby, N. S., a distance of three miles. There is also some talk of establishing a similar line between the pulp mill at Milton and Liverpool town, a distance of six miles.

WORSE THAN THE DISEASE.—Out in Arkansas they set fire to the cabin of a negro who had smallpox, and burnt up the cabin, negro and all. This is one way to stamp out contagious disease, but it will strike most people that the remedy is considerably worse than the disease.

ARBOR DAY.—At the Arbor Day meeting yesterday afternoon in the Guardian office, committees were appointed to wait on the Mayor concerning the observance of the early part of Queen's Birthday as Arbor Day, and to take charge of the planting of trees on certain streets. An adjourned meeting will be held at the same hour and place on Wednesday next.

BATTERS.—On Wednesday last, nine Nova Scotia vessels arrived at Souris, some of them having secured bait and others wanting to purchase it. Next day five more schooners arrived at the same port for bait. If they can't get enough spring herring there, they will have to go to the Magdalen Islands for them.

THEATRICAL.—Mr. and Mrs. Durward Lely, the celebrated Scottish vocalists, are asking for dates at the Opera House. They contemplate visiting Charlottetown next month.

PROFESSOR BRISTOL'S educated horses will not come to Charlottetown, at present, the agent not being able to arrange dates. A well-executed likeness of several of the ladies and gentlemen who took part in the recent presentation of Olivette at the Opera House may be seen in the show window of Cook's studio.

KILLED IN BOSTON.—Mr. John Joseph Connors, son of Mr. Thomas Connors, of Grand Tracadie, was accidentally killed by an electric car in Boston a few days ago, and his body was brought home for interment last evening. Mr. Connors left this Province about four years ago, and for some time past has been a conductor on the electric railway in Boston. He was well known and deservedly respected. His brother, Chas. A. Connors, accompanied the remains home.

A COMPARISON.—During the month of April the United States spent nearly a dollar and a half for every dollar paid in the treasury, making a deficit for the month of \$10,000,000, and for ten months of the fiscal year a deficit of \$65,000,000. During the same month of April Canada's revenue receipts were \$1,422,538, and revenue expenditures \$2,153,424, showing a surplus for the month of \$258,914. Canada's total revenue receipts for the first ten months of the fiscal year were \$30,288,354, and the expenditures therefrom were \$25,515,380, showing a surplus for the first ten months of the current fiscal year of \$4,772,974.

ANCIENT ORDER OF HIBERNIANS.—The national convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians convened at Omaha on Monday with nearly four hundred delegates in attendance. After gathering at headquarters the delegates marched in a body to St. John's cathedral, where a solemn high mass was celebrated and Bishop Scannell delivered a sermon. At the conclusion of the religious exercises the delegates returned to Moran's hall, where the convention proper was opened, with National Delegate Wilhere presiding. The committees were appointed, and the convention took a recess. At a caucus of the Pennsylvania delegation it was decided to support the candidacy of National Delegate Wilhere for re-election, and the prospects are that he will be chosen unanimously as the chief officer by the convention.

BURNED TO DEATH.—A very distressing accident happened at New Acadia on Wednesday afternoon last, by which Charlotte Olive, age six years, daughter of Mr. Joseph Peno, postmaster, lost her life. She was home at the time, and had been engaged in the early part of the day in clearing up some new land by burning the brush and stumps that were on it. In his absence the children went down to where the fires were still burning, which was only a few hundred yards from the house. They had not been long there when the mother heard a scream, and looking out of the window was horrified to see one of the little girls with her clothing all on fire. Before she had time to reach her the clothing was burned into embers. She carried her home in her arms, getting her own hands badly burned while doing so. Medical aid was sent for, but the poor little sufferer lingered but four hours after the accident. Much sympathy is felt for the parents in their great bereavement.

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.

A Young Lad Falls Over the Wharf at West River and is Drowned.

We hear with great regret that Samuel Darrach, aged 15 years, son of Mr. Alexander Darrach, of West River, fell over the wharf at that place, yesterday, and was drowned. It appears that young Darrach was mooring a boat when the accident occurred. The current was very strong at the time, and the unfortunate young lad was carried about one hundred yards before he sank. A younger brother of his was in the boat at the time, and witnessed the accident but was not able to render any assistance. Boats were out yesterday and today searching for the body, but at latest accounts it had not been recovered. The drowned lad's father is fireman on the steamer Elliott. The sad affair has cast a gloom over the community.

THE SOUL'S IMMORTALITY.

To be Passed Upon by a United States Surrogate Court. A recent despatch from Buffalo, N. Y., says: The Surrogate of this county will be compelled to pass upon this question of the immortality of the soul, by reason of a will contest just brought in this court. The circumstances are that one day last January, Mrs. Katherine Backus, a resident of the east side, died, leaving \$1,000 in the bank and several adult children. In her will she bequeathed the whole sum in trust to Nicholas Bushman, to be used by him to pay for masses for the benefit of the soul of the deceased and her husband.

The children have contested the will. The attorney raises the point that the soul of Mrs. Backus cannot receive any benefit from masses; that even if it could, a soul has no standing in a temporal court, and the trust is illegal because it is not for the benefit of any living human being; that the existence of a soul is not subject to proof, and that any trust for the benefit of something which may not exist is not warranted in law; that in any event the money would not actually go to the soul, but to some church, and that not even the church is designated, thus giving the trustee too much discretionary power. It is expected that Judge Stein will hand down a decision that will settle the standing of a soul in the courts of Erie county.
