World's Columbian Exposition, Chicago, 1893.

THE Government of the Dominion of Canada has accepted the invitation of the Government of the United States to take part in the World's Columbian Exposition, to be held in Chicago from 1st May to 31st October, 1893. As it is important that a very full display of Canadian products be made on that occasion, a general invitation is extended to Canadian producers and manufacturers in agriculture, horticulture, products of forests, fisheries, minerals, machinery, manufactures, arts, etc., to assist in bringing together such a display of the natural resources and industrial products of Canada, as will be a credit to the country.

An Executive Commissioner for Canada has been appointed, who will have the general charge of the exhibits and the allotment of space, and the several Provincial Governments have been invited to co-operate with the view of making the exhibition as complete and satisfactory as possible.

Dairying at New Perth.

The dairy building at New Perth is rapidly being pushed forward to completion by Mr. Murphy, the energetic contractor, of Montague Bridge. The ground length of the structure is 58 feet, with a covered way in front 13x19 feet. Its width is 25 feet. It stands on rows of cedar posts 10 inches in diameter, sunk 4 1/2 feet in the ground. Its height from the foundation to the eaves is 12 feet. The lower storey is in two compartments—one the "making," the other the "curing" room. The ceilings are 9 feet from the floor. The engine house is attached to the main building and separated from the "making" room by a double partition of two thicknesses each of sawn inch lumber with roofing-paper between.

A cold air drain will extend from under the curing room a distance of 100 feet into the adjoining field, with register grating in the floor. Three ventilators in the ceiling and roof will carry off odors from the curing room as the cheese on the shelves under goes the ripening process.

The working plant and general outfit for the concern are stored near the premises, and Mr. D. Hon, the superintendent, is here ready to place them and begin operations as soon as the building is ready to receive them and the milk supply is furnished.

Prof. Robertson is extremely anxious that the fodder corn experiments of last season will be repeated on a more extended scale this year; believing as he does that the cultivation and storage of the corn plant as a ration for milch cows contribute more to the success of the dairying industry than any other factor that may be named in the case.

The variety he particularly recommends for the Island are "Pearson and Longfellow's." These are said to mature early and fill their ears under ordinary conditions of soil and weather in the Maritime Provinces.

So far, I believe, these kinds are scarce at the seed stores, and others such as Mammoth Southern, etc., not so good perhaps for fodder, have been freely distributed.

It is still time enough for men in the seed trade, the Carters and others to import for a quantity of the Pearson and Longfellow's for this spring's planting. The season is good for corn till the 10th of June.

The success of the dairying business as everyone is ready to admit, will mainly depend on generous treatment of the milking herds. Without this the building of cheese and butter factories, the importation and distribution of expensive new strain of cattle, will be labor and money expended to little purpose. Let corn, therefore, be planted in abundance. If the land be good and seed of the right kind, it is sure to grow.

It matters little whether you plant in hills or rows. Only get it in the ground, give it plenty of room, don't bury it too deep, and keep it well hood through the summer.

News Notes.

Reports from Ontario state that the prospects for a good fruit crop are excellent. There are 80,000 barrels in England, whose hours average fourteen daily for a wage of 10 shillings per week.

The Quebec Chronicle states that the Credit Foncier Franco-Canadien is about closing up its business in that city.

New York's total real estate assessment for this year is put down at \$1,506,579,703, an increase of about \$42,000,000 over 1891.

The largest farm in the world is in Louisiana. It is 100 by 25 miles, and embraces 1,000,000 acres. It cost \$50,000 to fence it.

Despatches have been received confirming the news of the loss of 127 lives by the sinking of a Brazilian war ship near the mouth of the Rio de la Plata.

Three factories in the United States consume nearly 2,000,000 eggs a year in making the peculiar kind of paper used by photographers known as albumen paper.

A Shanghai despatch says serious threats are being made to destroy the French mission buildings at Tan Yang, which have been rebuilt since they were destroyed last year.

The celebrated trotter Rarus, for whom Robert Bonner in 1879 paid \$36,000, has just died of old age at Mr. Bonner's farm at Ferrytown. Rarus was king of the trotting turf in his day.

A report from Prince Albert, of last week, said that application was being made to the Minister of the Interior for the surveying and sub-dividing of twelve townships of the best land in the Prince Albert district, on which the applicants guarantee to locate 800 settlers from the states of Dakota and Maine and the province of Prince Edward Island.

Philadelphia has six day nurseries where working women with children, ranging from 3 months to 8 years in age can leave them from 6:30 in the morning until 6:30 at night. Three meals and ample amusements are given, costing the mother six cents a day. These institutions are supported by voluntary contributions. Other cities have them on much the same plan.

Lord Tennyson is the oldest living English author, his first book having been published in 1830. Mr. Gladstone comes next, his pamphlet, "The State in its Relations with the Church," appearing eight years later.

Policeman James A. Monahan, Twenty-Second Precinct, New York, has fallen heir to property valued at \$2,000,000 in Ireland.

Truxton Bale, United States' minister to Persia, has arrived in Washington on leave of absence. It is rumored that when he returns to his post of duty he will be accompanied by a bride in the person of Miss Hatfield Blaine, the youngest daughter of the Secretary of State.

The Queen of Portugal is this year the recipient of the Holy Rose, which the Pope bestows every year upon some Roman Catholic princess for virtue. The estimated value of the jewel is 50,000 francs (\$10,000). The jeweler who made it is a member of an ancient family of goldsmiths which has worked in the neighborhood of St. Peter's for the last 300 years. His fee was \$1,000. The stem of the rose is of solid gold, and measures about one yard. The cup of the flower is of the most delicate workmanship, and is set with magnificently set with small gems, in resemblance of dew drops. The whole work of art lies in a magnificent case of satin, mounted with silver studs.

MANY people are not aware that it is the wrapper of the tobacco which gives the color to the plug, and are therefore often deceived by a handsome outside appearance. The wrapper is a single film of leaf wrapped around the plug and is never good smoking tobacco. It is costly only because of its fine color.
