Although suffering from a heart disease for several years, yet her death, came as a distinct shock, on Sept. 28, to her family and friends for she had been up and around as usual on the day previous.

Elizabeth Jane (Bessie) MacDonald was born in Long Creek, on July 18, 1882, the daughter of Mary Jane Ross MacEachern and Neil MacEachern.

When quite young she went to Boston, Mass., where she was married in 1903 to Warren Romkey of Nova Scotia. They had one daughter, Vivian, the late Mrs. Perc Rodd

of Charlottetown, whose sudden passing four years ago was a great shock to her mother.

Her home in Boston was terminated after a few years by the ill health of Mr. Romkey when they returned to his former home in Nova Scotia until his death a few months later. With her daughter she returned to her old home at Long Creek.

In 1910 she married James MacDonald of Nine Mile Creek and in this district she spent the following 40 years until ill health required them to sell their farm.

They moved to Long Creek in 1949 and when Mr. MacDonald died two years ago, his wife moved in with their only son, Warren who left to mourn the passing of a loved mother.

The grandchildren are James and Constance MacDonald; (Doris) Mrs. C. Gallant, Picton, Ont.; Joyce, Mrs. G. MacFadyen, Augustine Cove; Shirley, Perc and David Rodd of Charlottetown also one sister, (Leah), Mrs. Samuel Good, of West Newbury, Mass.; and one brother, Bert of Prince Rupert, British Columbia.

The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon with a short service at the home followed by service in the Long Creek Baptist Church. The Rev. Harry Barbour was in charge of the service and Rev. Donald Nicholson assisting. Rev. Mr. Barbour brought the message from John 14 "In My Father's House Are Many Mansions, I Go To Prepare A Place For You."

A favorite hymn of Mrs. MacDonald, "Trust and Obey" was rendered by a grandniece, Miss Shirley MacDonald. Other hymns sung were "Abide With Me" and "The Lord's My Shepherd."

MRS. ALEXANDER (FLORA) MacLEOD

With deep regret the relatives and friends learned of the passing to her eternal rest of Mrs. Alexander (Flora) MacLeod of Hartsville on the morning of Oct. 13, 1953, in the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

The late Mrs. MacLeod, the former Flora Graham, was born in Broadalbane 73 years ago. She was the eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Murdoch Graham. Her husband predeceased her twenty years ago.

Although in failing health for the past few years, she was able to be about her household duties until on Wednesday, Oct. 7, when she was suddenly stricken with a heart attack. She was then taken to the Prince Edward Hospital, and her condition did not seem serious until three days before her passing. She suffered a severe stroke from which she did not recover.

Always of a sunny and friendly disposition, she endeared herself to all. She will not only be greatly missed in her home, but by friends and relatives far and near.

There are nine sons and four daughters, three sisters and one brother; also fourteen grandchildren left to mourn her loss.

The funeral which was held on Oct. 15, 1953 from the Hartsville Presbyterian Church, of which she was a member was largely attended. Her pastor, Rev. Lawrence Blaikie, spoke words of comfort to the bereaved relatives, taking as his text, I Corinthians, 13th chapter, 12th verse. He was assisted by the Rev. Donald Nicholson, Clyde River. The hymns sung were, "The Lord is My Shepherd," "Simply Trusting," a favorite hymn of the deceased, and "Abide With Me."

A solo, "We are Going Down the Valley," was sung by Murdoch MacLeod.

A large concourse of mourners and friends followed the remains to their last resting place in Hartsville cemetery. Thus, the remains of a fond and loving mother and sister were tenderly laid to rest beside her husband.
