### REV. J. A. SELLAR

The Rev. John Artemas Sellar, formerly of the N. B. and P. E. I. Conference, and an old Mount Allison man, died at the Central Alberta Sanitarium on April 3rd, triumphant in the faith of Christ. A writer in The Christian Guardian says: "Not more heroic the brave fellows from overseas, who are suffering and dying in the same sanitarium from the effects of military service, than this hero of the Cross, who gave such long and faithful service to the Red Men, from whom he contracted his fatal malady. Loving tributes were paid to his memory at a service in Calgary, conducted by Rev. Jas. Coulter, chairman of the district, assisted by Revs. Dr. G. W. Kirby, A. Barner, H. G. Cobbleck and C. A. Sykes. The remains were interred at Edmonton after a public service in Grace Church, in which several of the brethren referred to the splendid qualities of character and the faithful service of a brother beloved. Mrs. Sellar and her four children have the deep and practical sympathy of the whole Conference.—The West-Can.

The Mr. Sellar above referred to was born at Union Road, Queen's County, P.E.I., forty-eight years ago and was a son of the late Mr. Isaac Sellar. After graduating from Prince of Wales College he taught school for several years in his native Province. Then feeling a call to the Christian Ministry, he proceeded to Mt. Allison University, where he successfully completed the required course of studies, as well as graduating with a B.A. degree.

In the summer of 1905, when the Methodist Conference met in Charlottetown, he was one of a number who were ordained to the Christian Ministry. Not many days after his ordination he was married to Miss Carrie Priddle of Summerside, who was during all their wedded life in deepest sympathy with him in his Pastoral work. Their first charge was in Langdon, Alta., from where, after a few years of successful work they were sent to the Indian Reserve, in Northern Alberta. Here they spent ten years of unselfish service and devotion to the betterment of the poor Indian, and here he practically made the supreme sacrifice in the interests of the Kingdom of God.

He leaves to mourn, besides his wife and four children, his mother in Western Canada, five sisters and four brothers, namely: Mrs. J. W. Rodd, Harrington, P.E.I.; Mrs. J. L. MacLeod, Vancouver; Mrs. W. B. Prowse, Charlottetown; Mrs. G. H. Goring, Seattle, Wash.; Mrs. J. D. Lamont, Niagara Falls, W. Va.; Mrs. M. Morley, Edmonton, Alta.; Melville, Sask.; and Heber, Capar Sask. (Patriot please copy.)

### "Sheiks" Will Celebrate In Charlottetown On Victoria Day

May 21st, Victoria Day, promises to be a big day in Charlottetown. One of the features of the day will be the visit to this city of some one hundred and fifty Sheiks and Tribesmen of Khyber Sanatorium, O.B.H. & P., Moncton, accompanied by Supreme Clericus John L. Hayden of New York.

The purpose of this visit is to dedicate a new lodge known as Kirvan Sanatorium in the Oasis of Charlottetown, and to confer the degree of Humility on a large caravan of Neophytes, who will be sent across the desert via the "short trail."

Space forbids an adequate description of the "classic" program to be presented for the edification of the elite of the Saharas of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.
