51,000 Island Voters Slated To Cast Ballots

Upwards of 57,000 people are eligible to vote in Prince Edward Island today, as citizens make their choice among the even dozen candidates offering potential federal representatives at Ottawa.

There are 26,418 eligible voters in Queens, where there will be 127 polls; approximately 10,000 voters in Kings with 48 polls; and slightly more than 20,000 in Prince with 95 polls.

Candidates wound up their appeal Saturday and rested over Sunday to await the final flurry of activity that most candidates try to indicate on election day, though by that time their most effective action is to circulate among election workers and to show interest in what party people are doing for them at the polls.

UNUSUAL CAMPAIGN

It has been a most unusual campaign with an almost steady start that finished up, as it always does, in a flurry of activity through newspaper printing and news stories, as well as through the medium of the airwaves.

There was less personal contact in this campaign than in past, partly because of the season and the travelling, and partly because the old-fashioned "door-to-door" campaigning has gradually been slipping away, although the New Democrats' Tommy Dunne, in one of the most thorough persons

Cross-Examination Carried Out In Child Custody Case

The cross-examination of Dr. Benson Menace, Souris, by John P. Nicholson in the child custody case, was resumed Saturday before Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy in Supreme Court in Charlottetown.

The child, Marc Menace, had been awarded to the mother, the former Mrs. Alphonse Menace of Elizabethville, the Congo, in a previous hearing in Supreme Court which was appealed by Dr. Menace, who is at present practising dentistry in Souris and the case was referred back by the Appeal Court to Mr. Justice Tweedy in light of further evidence.

Dr. Menace testified that he and his former wife had been married in New York City and later moved to the Congo.

The boy was born there, and following their separation, his custody was awarded to Mrs. Menace.

Dr. Menace, however, took him from there and brought him to the United States, and then to Souris, P.E.I.

White witness was living in the United States he went to Mexico and got a divorce from his wife and two weeks later married the former Mariza Colombo, of Rome, Italy, who had been living in New York City, and whom he had known for about four years.
