available men, women and high-school boys and girls are busy ministering to the tourist trade. During the vacation season, the Peninsula population increases many times.

Natural attractions are not enough to satisfy the tourist. So, to be sure their "guests" are pleased, college extension workers started a new project through the 4-H Council to train young people for summer jobs which bring them in contact with tourists. They learn how to extend both hospitality and service, especially to tourists—for tourism is one of the three great industries of the Upper Peninsula.

Tomorrow's Dinner: to make a cocktail; ham loaf; horse-radish sauce; escalloped potatoes; green peas; celery-apple salad; raspberry Bavarian cream; coffee, tea, milk.

All measurements are level; recipes — for 4 to 6 — from the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.

Ham Loaf: Fat 1½ lbs. tenderized ham, fat removed, through the food chopper twice with 2 slices onion and ¼ lb. chuck steak. Add ¼ c. very fine soft enriched bread crumbs, 2 eggs unbeaten, 2 c. milk and ¼ tsp. pepper. Mix until thoroughly blended.

Pack into oiled 10" by 4" loaf pan. Let stand 30 min. to become firm. Bake 1½ hrs. in a slow oven, 300 degrees F. (Cover with aluminium foil the first 45 min)

When done, let stand a few minutes in pan; unmold on warm plate.

Raspberry Bavarian: Make up 1 pkg. raspberry-flavored gelatin according to directions, but use only 1 c. water. Refrigerate until syrupy. Stir in 1 c. drained, canned or frozen and thawed raspberries. Add 2 tsp. lemon juice.

Whip ¼ c. heavy cream until stiff; fold in. Rinse small molds or custard cups with cold water and dust with granulated sugar. Spoon in raspberry mixture. Refrigerate 4 hrs. or until firm.

Unmold on serving dishes. Garnish with a little syrup drained from the berries.

TRICK OF THE CHEF
When scalloping potatoes, for a change use ¼ as much onion, and layer vegetables with 3 c. cheese white sauce.
