

To The Moon Within 50 Years



Huge space ships, like the one shown here on its launching site, capable of crossing the U.S. at speeds up to 1,000 mph in a mere 45 minutes, will be common sights within 50 years, according to Lieut.-Gen. James Doolittle, retired U.S. World War II air leader. In an article appearing in a U.S. Aircraft Industries association magazine, Doolittle also predicted that space travel to the moon, in atomic-powered aircraft, will be a reality by the end of the century if aerial progress keeps up at the present rate. He said suspended platforms, above the earth's gravitational pull, will be launching sites for atomic rockets.

Statue Of Liberty Ruled In New York State

NEW YORK, (CP)—They finally figured out Thursday where the statue of Liberty is.

State Supreme Court Justice Thomas Corcoran ruled that although Bedloe's island, on which the statue stands, is closer to New Jersey than to New York in the Hudson river, it is nonetheless part of New York.

He found his authority in an 1883 agreement which settled a boundary dispute between the two states.

The agreement was that the state boundary should be down the middle of the Hudson river and the bay of New York—except that New York got to keep State Bedloe's and Ellis islands.

The ruling was important to Mrs. Evelyn Hill who runs a souvenir and food concession stand at the foot of the statue and who claimed that New York state had no right to tax her.

Justice Corcoran ruled that the taxes "were properly collected."

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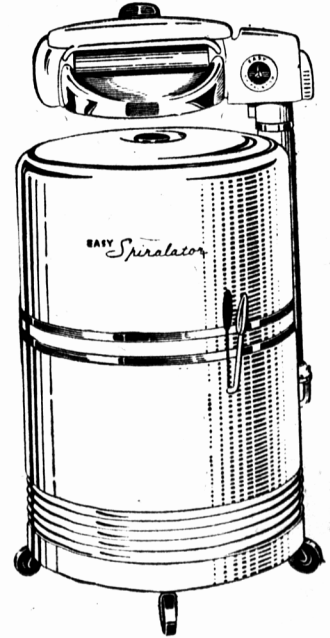


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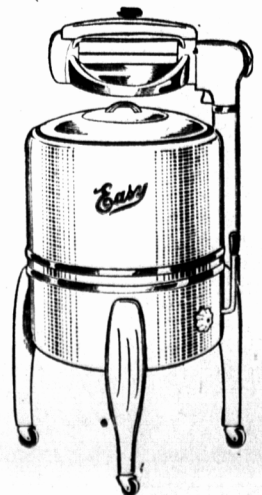
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
