As many of you already know, stormy weather causes swaying branches resulting in broken and burned wires which interrupt the electric power and communication services to your home.

The City Tree Committee, with the co-operation of the Provincial Forestry Engineer, have investigated the tree conditions in this city and have prepared a program of tree trimming to clear these service lines and maintain the decorative appearance of the trees.

Our crews will begin this program on Tuesday, January 12th, and will make every effort to shape and trim each tree to give adequate line clearance and preserve its ornamental appearance.

So, when you see our crews cutting limbs from a tree and maybe even removing entirely badly rotted trees, please remember they are only doing what is necessary to eliminate the cause of accidents and to ensure constant and trouble-free service to you.
