Rolling Stock Contracts.

Mr. COCHRANE, of Moncton, N. B., has secured the contract for the building of eighty flat cars, and Messrs. J. Harris & Co., of St. John, the contract for eighty box cars for the Intercolonial Railway.

Tenders are asked for locomotives, cars, &c., for the Canadian Pacific Railway, to be delivered during the next five years, amounting to about five millions of dollars.

The action of the Government in limiting the rolling stock for the Pacific Railway to Canadian manufacture ought to benefit the Lower Provinces, which have the advantage in cheap coal, iron and labor;
