NEW CRANE INSTALLED - Aiding in the greatly expanded work programme at the Bruce Stewart Company foundry is a recently installed 10-ton capacity crane with a twenty-five foot boom, capable of lifting a load anywhere inside the building. Replacing work on the mine-wrecker "Westmount" is expected to last until next March, and on the sister ship "Westmount" until March, 1953.

SHOTGUNS SEIZED - Last night 12 gauge shotguns were seized at Grand Tracadie by the Fish and Game Supervisor. The men, both residents of Grand Tracadie, will be charged under the Migratory Bird Regulations with hunting wild geese during the night. For the purpose of the regulations, during the night, is defined as being one half hour after sunset to one half hour before the next sunrise.

RETURNS FROM AMHERST - Mr. S. C. Wright, agricultural representative, Provincial Department of Agriculture, returned from Amherst yesterday after attending the opening days of the Maritime Winter Fair. The youth programme, which he helped to organize, was very good, as was the whole show, with very large entries in the dairy classes, and more Aberdeen Angus cattle exhibited than in previous years he reported.

PLACED UNDER SEIZURE - The first such action to be taken here for 20 years under the provisions of the Admiralty Act, occurred at the Railway wharf on Thursday when the motor vessel "Queen Charlotte" was placed under seizure. The action was taken by Russell-Hipwell, Ltd., Halifax, for whom Somerled Trainor of the legal firm of MacPhee and Trainor is acting, for the enforcement of a mortgage in excess of \$18,000 The boat is owned by interests in Shelburne, N.S.

WILL ATTEND MEETING - Word has been received that Mr. Leon Baker, M.P. for Three Rivers and national president of the Young Progressive Conservatives of Canada, will attend the annual meeting of the Provincial organization here on Nov. 7. It is expected that Messrs. W. Chester S. McLeure and J. Angus MacLean, Quebec's County representatives in Parliament, will be able to attend. The chief speaker at the meeting will be Mr. John Dieffenbacher, M.P. for Lake Centre.

RECALLS PRESENTATION - The forthcoming Royal visit will vividly recall a memorable occasion for Miss Mildred Harrington of Charlottetown, who on her first trip abroad was presented to Princess Elizabeth, then nine years of age, in 1936. The occasion arose when the Princess, with the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester, entertained the Vimy Ridge pilgrims at a garden party at Buckingham Palace. An unexpected visitor to the reception was King Edward VIII, and Miss Harrington's several photographs from London periodicals showing members of the Royal Family chatting with groups of the Canadian party.

ROYAL VISIT ARRANGEMENTS - Arrangements for the coming visit of Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh were further discussed yesterday at a meeting of the Royal Visit Advisory Committee held in the office of Premier J. Walter Jones. The final meeting of the committee to check last minute details will be held next Wednesday. Attending yesterday's meeting were representatives of the Police, Army, Civic and Provincial authorities and Canadian Legion officials. Also present were Group Capt. A. G. Kenyon, recently appointed commanding officer of the R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, and Wing Commander L. C. Dillworth, who is in charge of R.C.A.F. participation in the program.

Vocalist Thrills Ch'town Audience

Lovers of vocal music in this community received an outstanding thrill last evening in the P.W.O. auditorium as they sat enthralled by the beautiful soprano voice of Miss Dorothy Maynor, second artist to appear in the current series of the Community Concert Association.

Said to be one of America's truly great singers, Miss Maynor has amazing control over her beautiful clear and sweet lyric voice. Ranging from a pure, bell-like, almost coloratura quality in the higher register, to the contralto resonance which was heard in the lower notes, her voice retained at all times an exquisite beauty.

Even the greatest of voices however, need an intelligent artist to interpret music for the listening audience, and last evening Miss Maynor lived up to all expectations in this respect. This gift of interpretation was shown most clearly in a simple spiritual, "Were You There" which was sung unaccompanied. A thrilling solo over the audience as they listened to the beautiful old melody sung as no doubt they had never heard it sung before.

The major part of the program consisted of numbers which to the average listener were entirely new, but the soloist chose familiar melodies for her encores which met with the heartiest response. Especially beautiful among these, was Schubert's "Ave Maria" at the end of the program which was also well received. "I'm A Problem Child" and "No John, No."

MUNSAN, Korea, Nov. 3 - (Saturday) - (AP) - Buffer zone talks in the Korean armistice negotiations narrowed down Friday to one main issue - the status of Communist-held Kaesong, just south of Parallel 38. Except for minor adjustments, the Allies and Reds appeared generally agreed on the remainder of a cease-fire line stretching in a lazy S-shape northward across Korea. The Reds insist on keeping Kaesong, which straddles the historic invasion route toward Seoul - the rubbled Korean capital 34 miles to the southeast. An Allied spokesman said the United Nations demand that the Communists withdraw from Kaesong was firm but not final.

Will Represent Island Views On Railway Issues

OTTAWA, Nov. 2 - (Special) - J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal member of the Prince and parliamentarian assistant to Fisheries Minister Mayhew, was today named to the special committee of the Commons to consider railway legislation. He will present the views of the Province of Prince Edward Island on the various freight rate issues which will come under study by the committee.

Since his election in 1946, Mr. MacNaught has been very active in dealing with freight rate issues. He is credited with playing the major role in different rate reductions on the Prince Edward Island car ferries in recent years, and has spoken for the Province on numerous occasions on transportation problems.

One of the principal tasks of the newly formed committee is to consider the contentious bill No. 12 dealing with equalization of freight rates across Canada. Mr. MacNaught did not elect to speak on this bill when it came up in the Commons for second reading, feeling that representations such as he might make would be more forcible and precisely presented at committee sessions.

An early start will be made by the committee in its review of rate equalization problems.

NAVY LEAGUE MEETING - At a meeting of the Navy League of Canada held at E. M. C.S. "Queen Charlotte" last night, the President, J. J. Morris, gave a report of the League convention held in Toronto on the 25th and 26th of October. Eighteen scholarships will be given this year and due to the rise in college tuition fees, it was decided by the convention to boost the grants to boys taking courses from \$600 to \$850. A total of 2,000 boys will attend the three summer camps this year in British Columbia, Montreal and Cornwallis, N.S.

FOR ROYAL VISIT - It was announced last night that servicemen from the various military units in the local garrison would be on duty for the occasion of the visit Friday of Her Royal Highness Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh. They were requested to be at the Armouries in uniform early Friday morning as there would be many duties to perform other than taking part in the Guard of Honor which will be on parade in front of the Provincial Building.

Friendship House Movement Founder Speaks At S.D.U.

Baroness Catherine de Hueck Doherty, former Russian who founded the Friendship House Movement of social action, last night addressed a gathering of the Extension Department of St. Dunstan's College which is sponsoring her visit here.

Tonight she will speak at an open meeting at Notre Dame auditorium and tomorrow night at Holy Name Hall.

The Baroness was born and educated in Russia and served as a nurse with the Russian Army in the First World War. She later emigrated to the United States and then made her home in Canada in 1928. She recently returned from a visit to Rome where she was the personal delegate of the Bishop of Trent to the World Congress on the Lay Apostolate. During her visit she had an audience with Pope Pius XII.

She founded the Friendship House movement in 1930 and is now making a tour of the Maritime Provinces in its interest here.

RAILWAYS TOLD

Chief Commissioner must prevail. Mr. Justice Archibald's judgment was dated Oct. 29 and his order to the railways Oct. 31. He retired Nov. 1, to be succeeded by John J. Kearney, the new chief commissioner.

The ruling was based on the question of whether the C. N. R., by raising the Maritime rate on rough lumber violated the terms of the Maritime Freight Rates Act.

The rate was raised two months ago after the board ordered the railway to erase "unjust discrimination" claimed by a Quebec lumber company. The railway did so by increasing the Maritime rate to the rate prevailing in Quebec.

Under the Maritime freight rate structure, the law calls for maintenance of a 20-per-cent reduction in Maritime tolls, compared with rates in other parts of the country.

Mr. Justice Archibald's opinion was that the boosted rate did violate the freight law and ordered the low rate restored. Commissioners MacPherson and Sylvester believed the railway's action was not contrary to the spirit of the law.
