Charged With Making 2nd Escape From Jail Custody

A second charge of escaping custody was lodged against Harry Wendell McGee, at yesterday's session of the Police Court. The charge read that the accused being lawfully remanded for custody in the Queen's County Jail on Thursday, July 19, did escape custody Monday, July 23. McGee was picked up early yesterday morning and returned to the jail by Sheriff John Beaton.

When the charge was read, Magistrate Martin said, "what is that date Chief?" to which he received the reply July 23rd. "That is today," he said. "Yes Sir" answered Chief MacArthur.

In his last appearance before Magistrate K.M. Martin, July 19, the first charge of being unlawfully at large and escaping custody from Queen's County Jail, was laid

and remanded until yesterday. At the request of the Crown, represented by J.P. Nicholson, the accused was further remanded on both counts for one week. On the original charge of break, entry and theft at the store of T.L. Smith, Cumberland Street, July 1st, no further evidence was offered and the accused was committed for trial at the Supreme Court, R.R. Bell, Q.C. is appearing for the defence.

Appeal From Judgement In English Estate Case
Yesterday an appeal from the judgment of the Master of the Rolls Mr. Justice M. R. McGuire handed down on March 15, 1956 in regard to the \$7,000,000 estate of the late Florence Evelyn St. George, of London, England, opened in the Court of Appeal in Equity, with Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell and Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy, Vice Chancellor presiding. The principal question on the appeal is whether the testator exercised the power of appointment over certain property by her last will.

The original action for a declaratory judgment was commenced in 1948 and was referred to the full bench of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island which sat in November, 1955. The trust was set up from the estate of the father of Mrs. St. George at Charlottetown in 1934, with the Montreal Trust Company, as trustee.

Counsel for the plaintiff company are H. F. MacPhee, Q. C., and Eldridge Cate, Q. C., Montreal. The defendants are: Royal Exchange Assurance Co., London, represented by R. R. Bell, Q. C. and G. R. Foster; Lady Gunston, Evelyn St. George, Mrs. Winch and Richard W. Gunston are represented by Senator John T. Hackett, Q. C., Montreal, M. A. Farmer, Q. C., and David L. Drummond, London; Representing George St. George are K. M. Martin, Q. C. and William Harnish, New York. Children of the parties, represented by W. E. Bentley, Q. C. and J. O. C. Campbell appeared for the unborn infants other interests are represented by J. P. Nicholson.

In argument yesterday Mr. Bentley addressed the court on his appeal on behalf of the several infants concerned. He was followed by Mr. Nicholson for the other interests. At the conclusion of the latter's argument court was adjourned until 10:30 this morning.

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Souris Hospital Faced With Heavy Financial Difficulties

The fact that the hospital has been operating at a loss each year was the cause of great concern to the Board of Management of Souris Hospital at the annual meeting held last night.

In the financial report it was shown that the hospital last year operated at a loss of \$7,861 when ordinary receipts were compared with expenditure. A government grant of \$5,886 was responsible for reducing this debt to about \$2,000 but it was felt that some other ways and means must be had to keep the institution operating without a deficit.

Adding to the existing difficulties is the fact that the hospital is this year faced with an extraordinary expenditure of \$7,500 for repairs to the heating and cooking unit.

Commons Not Likely To Prorogue Before Aug. 11

OTTAWA (CP) — The government has shifted its target date for prorogation of the current session of Parliament to Aug. 11. The previous modern record of 140 sittings days was set last year.

A high government sources said today the business of the Commons is not likely to be concluded by Aug. 4 but the government hopes the work may be completed by Aug. 11.

That means the current third session is almost certain to go down in history as the longest of modern times—151 sitting days if the house rises by Aug. 11. The previous modern record of 140 sittings days was set last year.

In a drive to clean up business, the House begins six-day-a-week sittings today. Normally it meets five days a week.

About one-half the government's departmental estimates still require Commons approval along with more than a dozen pieces of legislation.

Eisenhower Says Feeling Better

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — President Eisenhower, saying he is feeling "better every day," talked separately with 11 presidents or presidents-elect of American republics Monday. It was his busiest round of conferences since his June 9 intestinal operation.

Beaming and gay, Eisenhower met with each for a half hour or less at the U.S. Embassy.

Eisenhower stayed over for an extra day on his goodwill visit to Panama in order to hold the farewell conference.

Eisenhower told one of his guests, President-elect Hernan Siles Zuzazo of Bolivia, that "on this trip I have been improving every day."

The U.S. president looked fit despite the fact he was up late Sunday night at a reception for Panama President Ricardo Arias and his wife. Eisenhower limited himself to a quarter-glass of champagne and took no food.

Saturday he was overheard to remark: "I haven't much strength but I keep going."

SHEDIAC Plans Lobster Festival
SHEDIAC, N.B. (CP)—Lobster Newburg, lobster salad and lobster broiled are among the crustacean delights that help transform this quiet town of 2,100 into city proportions once a year.

With bigger and better plans for its annual mid-August festival, Shediac again is getting ready to burst at the seams. It hopes to attract as many as 20,000 tourists this year.

A colorful town with a colorful background, Shediac has been dubbed the lobster capital of the world because of its famed five-day frolic when lobster is king.

Acadian by origin, the town today blends two languages and remembers a heritage both English and French. By-passed by the British in 18th century reprisals against the Acadians, the town accepted its first English settlers in the early 1800s.

Acadomian fishing and farming folk, the inhabitants go quietly about daily chores but the festive mood begins to move in many weeks before the big lobster event. There are lobsters to be trapped and pooled, floats to be made and lobster crests to be fashioned. The happy spirit of co-operation that dominates these preparations bursts into the open when the celebrations dawn. And some of it appears rubs off. The folks in Shediac say more and more tourists are returning each year to enjoy the lobster and the gaiety.
