CANADIAN.

YARMOUTH, N. S., Aug. 22.

The Baptist Convention has been all day engaged in listening to the business statements of Rev. W. F. Armstrong, returned missionary from India, in relation to his connexion with the board, and the replies thereto by Rev. W. P. Armstrong, secretary-treasurer, and John March, Esq., who elaborated a statement of facts and figures to show the complete history of receipts and expenditures in the foreign mission field. It is probable the matter will be settled to-night. Great interest is taken in the proceedings of the Convention. The attendance continues very large.

YARMOUTH, N. S., Aug. 20.

The Baptist Convention met to-day at 10 a. m. Nearly 300 delegates are present. The President, O. Longley, opened the session, after which the following officers were elected:—

President—T. H. Rand, D. C. L. Vice-Presidents—A. Simpson, P. E. Island, J. W. Bars, Wolfville.

Secretaries—Rev. E. M. Keirstead, Windsor, N. S., Rev. Geo. O. Gates, Moncton, N. B. Treasurers—C. W. Saunders, Yarmouth, and Asa T. Morse, Paradise, N. S.

The following committees reported in part: On obituaries: state of the denominations in regard to obituaries. Two deaths are reported during the year—Rev. James Stevens and Rev. Charles Tupper, D. D.

The afternoon session was occupied in the discussion of the report of the board of foreign missions. Three mission fields are now occupied by the missionaries in the Madras Presidency. The board contemplates the sending of another family immediately to reinforce the mission. Before the report, which was vigorously discussed by some score of members of the Convention—was adopted, the time for closing the afternoon session had arrived.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.

The people on the streets this morning were gloomy countenances as they read in the morning papers accounts of the President's condition. There is increased anxiety observable in the crowds who gather around the bulletin boards, and various expressions of regret and sorrow are heard in subdued tones on all sides. As no decisive improvement of the President is announced the anxiety of the public continues.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.

Official bulletin, 8.30 a. m.—The President has not vomited since yesterday p. m. and this morning has twice asked for and received a small quantity of fluid nourishment by the mouth. He slept more quietly during the night and this morning his general condition is more encouraging than when the last bulletin was issued. Pulse, 104; temperature, 98.4; respiration, 11.

EXECUTIVE MANSION, 11 p. m.

Soon after the evening examination the President went to sleep and slept continuously for two hours. His fever has gradually abated, and his pulse has fallen to 102. Dr. Boynton who came from his room a short time since reports that he seems slightly better than at the date of the evening bulletin. He has swallowed to-day in all about 20 ounces of liquid food, and has taken 18 or 20 ounces by enema. So far as ability to take nourishment is concerned his condition to-night is better than last night. In other respects it is substantially unchanged. The Department of State has received from Dr. R. Ellis, an eminent surgeon of England, through Minister Lowell, a package of draining tubes and other surgical instruments, of which he is the inventor, which are largely used in the English hospitals, and which he recommends for use by the President's physicians. The package has been forwarded to the surgeons in charge of the President's case. The instruments are accompanied with full instructions how to use them, and also with a letter of endorsement from Sir James Paget, one of England's greatest surgeons. Since 11 o'clock the President has rested quietly and comfortably, and at this hour is asleep.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.

It is stated that the Irish Dynamite Council, yesterday, adopted a proclamation recommending the destruction of all vessels in America, or other ports, which carry the English flag, and warning all ocean travellers to avoid English ships after September 1st. A convention is to be held at Jones' Wood, next Monday, of all the Irish revolutionary brotherhood to ratify the proclamation.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Aug. 22.

The Times says the Ecumenical Methodist Conference, which is to meet in this city next week, promises to be one of the most interesting and important religious gatherings held since the days of the Wesley. The various denominations of the Methodists number over four million actual communicants, and the Methodist population is computed at 18,000,000. The members of the conference number four hundred, half of whom represent British and Continental Methodism, and half the churches in the United States and Canada. The Conference is composed of lay and clerical delegates in equal proportion. Its main objects will be to devise means for prosecuting home and foreign work so as to result in the greatest economy and efficiency, to increase the moral and evangelical power of common Methodism, and to secure more speedy conversion of the world.

LIMERICK, Aug. 22.

Capt. Graham, master of the British barque Wildwood, has been fined \$100 on the prosecution of the customs authorities here for neglecting to report within three days after the arrival of his vessel from New York, May 16th last, that he shipped a quantity of merchandise received from a Norwegian vessel he fell in with on the passage from London.

LONDON, Aug. 22.

The Times says the Parnellites have determined to abstain from protracted opposition the remainder of the session. Several members desire to proceed to Ireland as soon as possible, to confer with their colleagues on the Land bill.

EUROPE AND THE EAST. ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 22. The King and Queen of Denmark arrived at Cronstadt. They were met by the Czar, Czarina and Grand Duke, and proceeded to Peterhof with them. LONDON, Aug. 22. The Times has the following from Berlin: The result of the French elections may influence negotiations for an alliance between Italy and Germany. PARIS, Aug. 22-6 p. m. M. Constans, Minister of the Interior, classifies the results of the elections as follows:—Republican Left and Republican Union, 34; Royalists and Clericals, 40; Bonapartists, 33; Extreme Left, 36; and Intransigent, 3. In fifty-five places second ballots will be necessary. It is still doubtful whether Gambetta has obtained an absolute majority in the second circumscription of Belleville. It is believed that he has not.

PARIS, Aug. 22. Private advices state that the explorer Stanley is lying dangerously ill half way between Stanley Pool and the mouth of the Congo. He has so little faith in his own recovery that he has made his will.

Weather Bulletin. Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the Maritime Provinces.

A Year's Railroad Foreclosures. The Chicago Railway Age publishes an article on railroad foreclosures of 1880, showing that thirty-one roads, with a mileage of 3,375 miles, representing an apparent investment of \$116,500,000 in bonds and \$97,000,000 in capital stock, making the vast total of \$213,500,000, have been added during 1880 to the long list of companies sold out under foreclosure, with the accompanying loss to their owners and creditors.

The Liberal Club of Greenwich town, which Mr. Gladstone represented last Parliament on the 18th, presented him with an elegantly carved library chair of oak, an extremely handsome specimen of English handicraft. In a brief speech to the committee who presented the chair, Mr. Gladstone said that until he delivered up to other and worthier hands the heavy charge now imposed upon him, he hoped that he would do nothing to disparage the confidence now reposed in him. The remarks and the tone of weariness in which they were delivered have been construed as evidence foreshadowing the early retirement of the Premier from active politics.

A Rome despatch says the Pope has sent an autograph letter to the Emperor William thinking him for nominating Dr. Korum as Bishop of Treves. Bismarck and Windthorst, in view of the approaching elections for members of the Reichstag, are secretly treating for an alliance by which Bismarck will secure a majority, and consent to the almost total abolition of the May laws.

Both in England and the United States the crops are turning out to be shorter than was expected. The corn crop of the States will be the smallest since 1874. Last year it was less than the previous year, and the decline from last year is placed at about 600,000 bushels, and even this deficit may be increased by bad weather.

The London Times has an editorial apropos of the Canadian census and the Governor-General's North-Western tour, calling attention to the growth of the Dominion and to the fertility of the prairie region and its advantages as a field for immigration.
