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Rangers Upset Canadiens 3-1 In Series Opener

NEW YORK, March 29 (CP) — New York Rangers scored a pair of goals in the first two periods while Montreal was short-handed and added another in the closing seconds of play to upset the Canadiens 3-1 tonight and take a one-game lead in the best-of-seven semi-final Stanley Cup playoffs.

A crowd of 13,622 at Madison Square Garden saw Rangers refuse to go down to defeat after Canadiens took a 1-0 lead at 8:27 when Norm Dussault scored from a power play while Rangers were short two men due to penalties.

Probes Cause Of Howe Injury

DETROIT, March 29 (CP) — Clarence Campbell, president of the National Hockey League, today personally conducted an investigation of the incident in the Stanley Cup playoff game last night which sent Gordie Howe, star Detroit Red Wing forward, to hospital with severe head injuries.

He told reporters after a conference with officials of the Wings and Toronto Maple Leafs that statements from the three game officials indicated no Toronto player was responsible for the injuries. The investigation will continue, however.

Tonight, officials at Harper Hospital said the 21-year-old star from Saskatoon has shown some improvement. He underwent a delicate brain operation a few hours after he was carried from the ice on a stretcher in the third period of the game which Leafs won 5-0.

Team Doctor C. L. Tomsu and Dr. Frederick Schreiber, a brain specialist, reported that x-rays showed no skull fracture. Howe's nose and right cheekbone were fractured, however, and he suffered an eye laceration.

There were others on both teams too, who came up with first class performances, and included Wendell Burke and Cliff Gillis of Queen Square who garnered four goals each, while Junior Cahill of Summerside equalled their efforts also with four tallies. Maynard Schurman and Dalton, also of the visitors, came up with two and one respectively, while Bob Kelly of the locals also tallied the other team marker.

Although Q.S.S. chalked up the first two tallies of the night in a little less than the first six minutes of the first frame, Summerside came back with a powerful rally led by the two Schurman boys and Cahill, to bang home five goals in a row to end the period with a 5-2 advantage, and continuing the pressure into the second, came up with three more by the 9:23 mark for a lopsided 8-2 ad-
