SDU Split In Weekend Hoop Games At Halifax

The Saint Dunstan's University basketball team came out of Halifax with a win and a draw over the weekend in games against Saint Mary's University and the Stadacona Sailors. The games were the first of the season for the young and inexperienced Saints and the local scholars gave a splendid account of themselves against the bigger Nova Scotia teams. Saint Mary's won Saturday night's game played in the Saint Mary's University Gymnasium by a 51-44 score. On Sunday afternoon the Saints edged Stadacona 52-51 by scoring a basket in the last minute of play. Playing with almost an entirely new team from that which wore the Red and White colors a year ago, the Saints surprised even their most ardent rooters during the opening minutes of Saturday's game against Saint Mary's. They raced into an early lead and maintained the lead all during the first quarter. The Saintamarians came on fast during the second quarter to go out front and stayed there although hard pushed by the local team. Early in the second half the Saints lost the services of John "Hondo" Kelly, Bill Farmer and Peter McConnell via the foul route. However they bounced right back and led by big Eugene Lake cut down the Saintamarians lead to only three points near the end of the final quarter. John Kelly was the Saints high scorer followed by Gene Lake. The Saints lead from the opening whistle until the start of the fourth quarter against Stadacona on Sunday. In the fourth quarter the Saints moved up on even terms with the Saints and the teams waged a see saw battle down to the wire. With only two minutes left in the

game Stadacona jumped into a three point lead. "Hondo" Kelly scored for the Saints to cut the lead to one point and with only 45 seconds remaining Chick Morrison potted what proved to be the winning basket. The ball changed hands twice during the rest of the game. The Saints threw away a long shot and then the Saints carelessly lost possession with only 20 seconds to go. As the players fought for the ball under the Saints basket with three seconds remaining a Stadacona player earned two penalty shots. He missed on both efforts after scoring seven throughout the game. Syndicate Buys Richmond Club

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—A syndicate of six wealthy businessmen Monday bought Richmond's International League baseball club lock, stock and barrel from the federal tax collector. They paid \$20,000. With the team went control of its Triple-A franchise, the contracts of 20 players and physical assets including a giant electric score board which cost almost as much as the syndicate paid this afternoon. The \$20,000 bid by the syndicate was not quite a fourth of the \$79,218.68 in back taxes sought by the government when, in an unprecedented action, it seized the club and its assets last month and announced it would sell them at auction.

"A Matter Of Breaks," Says Edmonton Coach

EDMONTON (CP)—In adverse weather "it's a matter of how the breaks go," says coach Frank (Pop) Ivy of Edmonton Eskimos. Ivy is busy preparing his charges for Wednesday night's second game of the best-of-three Western Inter-provincial Football Union final with Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

And the forecaster isn't promising any breaks in the weather. "Zero or slightly below that with no great amount of wind and no snow," is the weather office's prediction for the game.

"GREAT EQUALIZER"

"Bad weather is always a great equalizer," Ivy said Monday. He replied "absolutely not" when asked if he'd like to predict the outcome of the game.

A victory will send Eskimos into their second-straight Grey Cup final and give them a chance Nov. 26 at Vancouver to win a second consecutive Canadian championship—something no western team has ever accomplished.

The Eskos won the first game of the WIFU final Friday, whipping Bombers 29-6 on windswept Winnipeg Stadium's frozen field. If a third game is necessary, it will be played here Saturday night.

Neither club has reported any serious injuries. Bombers ran through 30-minute drills in the snow at Winnipeg Sunday and Monday and leave Tuesday afternoon for Edmonton.

Eskimos worked out Sunday afternoon and Monday night in five-below-zero temperatures.

NEW YORK (AP)—The United States Golf Association, alarmed over the revelation that a "ringer" had played in an invitation tournament on which a big betting pool depended, called on all its member clubs Monday to discourage organized gambling on golf and to tighten up enforcement of the rules.

In a strongly-worded statement headed "the integrity of golf is at stake," USGA President Isaac B. Grainger said the incident at the Deepdale Club's invitation four-ball tournament in September had "disgraced the good name of golf" and emphasized the dangers inherent in organized gambling.

Early this month, Charles Bud Helmar of West Springfield, Mass., admitted he had played in the Deepdale tournament under an assumed name and that he had the partner had won it with the aid of falsified handicaps. The USGA is investigating the amateur status of the players involved.

Nats Expected To Bring Up Rocky Nelson

NEW YORK (AP)—Washington Senators, having traded off veteran first baseman Mickey Vernon to Boston, are expected to draft 31-year-old Rocky Nelson from Montreal when the major leagues hold their annual draft meeting at Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 28.

The Senators, because of their last place finish in the American League, will get the first draft pick from a huge selection of minor league players. Nelson, a great hitter in the minors, has failed in five previous big league trials. He led the (International) League last season with a .363 batting average and was the top slugger with 37 home runs and 129 runs batted in.

Last year 13 players were drafted but only six—pitchers Art Ceccarelli, Cloyd Boyer and Roberto Vargas; and outfielders Jim King, Roberto Clemente and Glen Gorbous—remained all season.

This year's list includes numerous veterans such as Monte Irvin, Gene Bearden, Ben Wade, Connie Marrero, Dick Sisler, Steve Ritzik, Bob Kuzava, Sam Dente, Fred Baczewski, Joe Presko, Al Corvin, Lloyd Merriman and Tom Lasorda.

SUNDERLAND, England (AP)—Inside left Vladimir Ilyin scored for Moscow Dynamo four minutes from the end and gave the Russians a 1-0 victory over Sunderland, English League leaders, in a floodlit soccer match before a sell-out crowd of 55,000 Monday night. It was the second game of Dy-

namo's visit. They lost 2-1 to Wolverhampton Wanderers last Wednesday.

Baseball Club Old Monday

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—The Richmond Virginians Baseball Club, its franchise in the International League, and all its assets were sold Monday by the federal tax collector to a syndicate of six Richmond businessmen for \$20,000.

Only one bid was offered. It was by David Atterfield III and David Einstein, lawyers who were agents for the syndicate. In addition to the money to be paid for the ball club, the syndicate will assume other debts of the team in excess of \$30,000.

The sale was held at the Virginians' home park, Parker Field. The syndicate which bought the team has promised to keep the club in Richmond. The federal tax collector sold the club to satisfy a \$79,218.68 tax lien. Richmond owner Harry Selbo could have held his team if he had paid the money before 2 p.m. but he didn't.

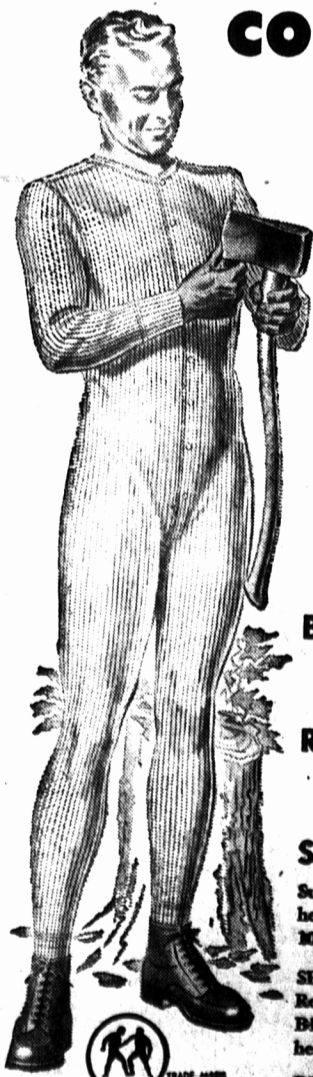
Million Dollar Stadium Proposed For Montreal

MONTREAL (CP)—A plan for proposed construction of a multi-million dollar stadium by private capital was submitted to the city executive committee Monday by Montreal sportsman Leo Dandurand.

The proposed \$3,000,000 stadium would accommodate about 40,000 persons and would have parking facilities for about 10,000 cars. It would also conform with a master plan of the east-end recreational

centre. Mr. Dandurand told the executive committee his syndicate would be willing to buy the land for the stadium provided the city would sell it at its present municipal evaluation. He also urged the committee to reach a decision as soon as possible so that the stadium could be completed before Aug. 1, 1957, enabling Montreal to bid for the Grey Cup game in that year.
