## MONDAY

After surviving the crash of a jet plane which occurred near Bangor, Me., on Saturday, F/O Peter Hawkes, a navigator with the R.C.A.F., was killed last evening along with another airman when an Expediter aircraft which had been sent from Montreal to pick him up crashed at St. Hubert's, Quebec, while coming in for a landing.

The distressing news was received here yesterday by his widow, the former Olive Downe of this city, daughter of Mrs. Downe and the late Percy Downe.

A meeting of the executive of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation was held in the Federation Office, 81 Prince St., Charlottetown on Saturday morning, Oct. 2. The following members were present: President, Earl Jelley, 1st vice president, Elmer Pineau, 2nd vice president, Mabel Matheson, Mabel O'Brien, Mabel Auld, and secretary, Estelle Bonness. Miss Helen Yeo, chairman of the Easter Convention program was present also.

The largest convention to be held in Charlottetown during its coming centennial year will be District 284 of Rotary International which takes place on June 8-8. This information was received over the week-end by President of the Charlottetown Rotary Club, Col. J. H. Shaw in a message received from District Governor of Rotary Alan MacDonald of Glace Bay, Nova Scotia.

Two men were taken to hospital for treatment of burns following a fire about 8 a.m. on Saturday which completely gutted the two-room one-storey home of Mr. and Mrs. Amand Arsenault on North Market Street in Summerside, forcing six members of the family to escape through a small window.

The two men in hospital are the owner of the home, Mr. Arsenault, who suffered burns to his back together with having the back of his head singed from the flames; and his father-in-law, Mr. Sylvan Cassie, who suffered burns to both feet.

## TUESDAY

There was considerable bustle at the local office of the National Employment Service yesterday with many men seeking work on the new Federal building where preliminary operations are to commence this morning.

The County Construction Co. which has the contract for the demolition of the old buildings on the site, secured a crew of men at the employment office during the busy day. All of the men were laborers. It is possible that more men will be needed as the work progresses.

Potato growers from various parts of the Province were also looking for men and a dozen at least were despatched to rural points. There is every indication, say Employment officials, that the harvesting of the tuber crop is speeding up in a seasonal peak. Some of the potato pickers sent to growers were from the mainland, but others were Island residents.

## WEDNESDAY

Charges that Quebec potatoes are being offered for sale in "Prince Edward Island" stamped bags just been made by Mr. E. B. Ellis, senior fruit and vegetable inspector, Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown.

Mr. Ellis, who for the past two months has been posted on "destination inspection" at Montreal, states that he saw truckloads of allegedly Island potatoes being distributed to the retail stores of that city when no potatoes had as yet been shipped from the Province. Mr. Ellis explains that the law calling for the use of new bags which applies in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick does not apply in Quebec and that buyers there are quick to take advantage of this situation.

In solution to the problem, Mr. Ellis makes an alternative of two suggestions: (1) That shippers refrain from using stamped bags for potatoes destined to Quebec points and substitute plain bags with tags only attached, (2) That the potato agencies in the Province employ a man who would be responsible for seeing that the Island product is not misrepresented in other Canadian centres.

The three sub-grading jobs on the Trans-Canada Highway between the Queen's Arms and a point just west of Bonshaw, which are rapidly nearing completion, constitute the heaviest earth movement ever undertaken in this Province and mark an achievement which reflects much credit on the firms involved.

The levelling of hills and the building up of deep hollows, with the widening of the highway to standard, as required on this important route of travel, has changed portions of the highway almost beyond recognition.

In many places buildings have been moved back to new locations in order to make room for the broadened new highway and to eliminate turns which would otherwise be a menace to safety.

The Guardian was advised last evening by Mr. D. A. MacDonald, chairman and manager of the P. E. I. Potato Marketing Board, that at a meeting of Board members yesterday it was agreed that the Board's proposed marketing plan for this season shall be held in abeyance until such time as the result of the Government's proposed plebiscite on the matter shall be determined.

"It was also agreed," Mr. MacDonald stated, "no price control of any kind would be exercised by the Board until the declared wishes of a majority of Island producers on the subject are known, because in the opinion of most of the Board members their proposed marketing plan is the only alternative to no market price control at all.

"In the meantime," he added, "the Board's licensing programme on a similar basis to last year's will be proceeded with without further delay."

Max Ferguson, CBC's multi-voiced announcer was the feature entertainer at the Old Time Fiddling and Step-dancing championship finals held before a large crowd at the Forum last night. The show was sponsored by the Alpha Y's Men's Club under the direction of Mr. Art Duvar and presided over by president, Dr. W. R. Carson.

The Weatherie Trio from Charlottetown stole the show as they walked away with two first prizes and one third. George won the Old-Time Fiddling contest, Marilyn the ladies step-dancing finals while Leona was third in the step-dancing. Charles Walker from Johnson's River won the men's step-dancing competition.

Strong north westerly gales brought lobster trap landings to a halt on the south shore of P.E.I. yesterday where the lobster season ended at midnight. With the exception of hurricane "Edna" which destroyed a number of boats but caused little trap damage. Yesterday's storm was the worst of the south side season with fishermen in the Miminegash area where only about one half of the traps are more expecting considerable damage.

At Roseville and Campbellton all of the gear is reported to have been landed in the past two weeks. The fall lobster catch in West

Prince, is estimated at slightly more than one half of last year's total but exceptionally high prices brought good returns to the fishermen. The landing of illegal (short) lobsters is reported to have been practically nil during the season. Highest prices paid at Miminegash were 31 for canners and 36 for markets.

## THURSDAY

Miss Roma Burke, 21 year old Charlottetown girl was killed yesterday evening in level crossing accident at the outskirts of Lachine, Quebec, when the car was hit by a Montreal bound train. A second girl believed to be Miss Marilyn Rupert, 24, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Rupert was also killed in the train crash. Miss Lois Burke is in hospital suffering from shock and other injuries.

The three girls had left Charlottetown last Monday in Miss Lois Burke's car. The Burke sisters were going as far as Montreal and Miss Rupert was going to Toronto where she had recently been transferred to the office of the Household Finance Company.

Lachine police report that the car carrying the three girls approached the crossing with a red light standing at the station and although the signals were flashing it is thought that the girls took it to be for the standing train. However another train on a parallel track struck the vehicle as it attempted to cross, carrying it 125 feet along the right of way.

The identity of Miss Roma Burke has been established and while police cannot definitely state that the second victim is Miss Rupert it is presumed that since she was travelling with the Burke sisters that she is the other girl killed.

Mr. Rupert will leave Charlottetown today to identify the bodies of both Miss Burke and Miss Rupert were well known in this city. Miss Burke attended Prince of Wales College and for the past year has been employed at Maritime Central Airways. Miss Rupert was well known for her musical talents and her voice, blending with those of her two sisters, has been heard before many Charlottetown audiences. She was also a member of the Baptist Church choir and was ready to give of her talents on any occasion.

Miss Burke is a daughter of Mrs. Fred Burke and the late Mr. Burke of Spring Park. Carl of M.C.A. and William of the Burke Electric are half brothers.

Building has commenced at Souris for the housing of a modern fish meal and fish oil plant that will process offalls from cod, haddock and whole body fish from herring, caplin and similar fish. It is hoped that the plant will be in operation early in December as the caplin catch will be available until the end of February. It is expected that these fish will be purchased and processed until that time.

It is the intention of those interested to process herring for fish meal and fish oil. The herring will be available from the Egmont Bay district, supplemented by further quantities from the Magdalen Islands.

Helgi H. Zoega of Iceland, who is associated with Albert Griffin in this expansion of the fishing industry in Souris, has purchased the home formerly owned by Arthur McQuaid, and is now residing there with his family.

Mr. Zoega was instrumental in bringing to the province Andre Jesson, also of Iceland, who arrived at Wood Islands yesterday, with the object of investigating the future possibilities for processing and packing herring in the requirements of Canadian, United States and European markets.

Mr. Loyal Brown, C.B.C. press and information representative for the Maritimes, and Mr. Bert Wilson, press and information assistant (TV), completed a two-day visit to P. E. I. yesterday for the purpose of furthering promotion of programs originating from, or having backgrounds in this Province.

Interviews were also conducted with persons closely associated with L. M. Montgomery of Green Gables fame, as the network is now conducting a series of children's programs based on the book "Anne of Avonlea."

## FRIDAY

MONTREAL (CP)—The bodies of two Charlottetown women killed Wednesday night in a car-train collision at suburban Lachine will be flown today to Charlottetown for burial.

Accompanying the bodies will be R. J. Rupert, father of one of the women. Mr. Rupert identified the body of his 24-year-old daughter, Marilyn, at the morgue here Thursday.

Miss Rupert was killed instantly when the car was struck by a Montreal-bound Canadian National Railways passenger train at a level crossing.

Roma Isabelle Burke, 21, died en route to hospital.

Lois Burke, 23-year-old sister of Roma and driver of the car, was still in hospital at Lachine. Her condition was described as "very good."

After hearing the evidence of seven witnesses before a coroner's jury empaneled on Sept. 27, and adjourned until last night, invest-

igating the death of John J. McKenna, Coroner Dr. L. E. Frowse announced that five witnesses remained to be heard and further adjourned the hearing until Tuesday, Oct. 12 at 8 p.m. in City Hall.

William Robertson, 28-year-old farm laborer from Birch Hill, was seriously injured last evening about 6:15 when he was struck by a truck on the Charlottetown-Montague highway as he was riding a bicycle near Fowal school. Robertson was riding on the left side of the road toward Charlottetown and that he was in collision with a truck driven by Patrick Casey of Five Houses. Mr. Casey states that the lights of an approaching vehicle temporarily blinded him. He immediately stopped and rendered all assistance possible.

The injured man was taken by ambulance to the Prince Edward Island Hospital where his condition is described as serious. His physician reports that he has a broken leg and head injuries, the full extent of which have not as yet been determined.

—Rev. J. R. McMahon of the Alberton branch of the Canadian Legion was appointed West Prince zone commander at a zone rally held at Tignish last night. The meeting was opened by the president of the Tignish branch, Comrade Peter Gaudet, who extended a cordial welcome to the official delegates and Legion members present. Delegates from Tignish, Alberton, St. Anthony's, O'Leary and St. Louis branches, and members of Miscouche and Summerside Legions were in attendance.

—The Summerside Board of Trade last evening approved a resolution deploring the damage caused by vandalism to the new rink at Summerside, and suggested that steps be taken to protect the property from further destruction.

This action followed discussion on the subject which dealt with damage done to the Raceway Stadium which was built less than a year ago.

Recently windows have been shattered, overhead lights broken, glass in the ticket window smashed, and at least two holes punched in the hard asbestos siding, one of which is large enough to permit entry to the rink. It was reported last evening that action was being taken yesterday to have the damage repaired.

—A coroner's jury empaneled by Coroner W. A. Shea to inquire into the cause of death of Peter Broderick and Stephen Graves, which occurred on Sept. 24th, brought in the following verdict: "That Stephen Graves and Peter Broderick came to their deaths on Sept. 24, 1954, at Alberton by accidently taking internally a liquid commonly called oil of wintergreen, and all persons connected in any way are exonerated from all blame."

# Newspaper Corporation Dedicates Huge American Newsprint Mill

CALHOUN, Tenn. (AP)—A \$60,000,000 newsprint mill, largest to be built in the United States in a quarter century, was dedicated today by Bowaters Southern Paper Corp., an American subsidiary of Bowater Paper Corp. Ltd., of London.

The plant represents the biggest investment by British industry in the United States since the end of the Second World War. Situated on an 1,800-acre site on the Watauga river, 40 miles northeast of Chattanooga, the mill has an initial capacity of 130,000 tons of newsprint and 55,000 tons of kraft pump a year. It employs 700 persons.

Sir Eric Vansittart Bowater, chairman of Bowaters, the world's largest producer of newsprint, described the Tennessee mill as "a shining example of 'trade not aid' between Great Britain and the United States."

"The reinstatement of British investment here which was suspended during the Second World War in the defence of our Western democracy," Sir Eric said, "is of major importance to our economy, and I am sure it was hoped

that this mill would give a lead and fill-up to British industry overseas. Our mills represent one of the first major efforts by British industry in the post-war period to increase dollar earnings by establishing manufacturing plants within the United States.

"Bowaters' entry into the manufacturing field with the greatest newsprint mill in the world is an outstanding example of international co-operation on the industrial level."

Peyton Anderson, president of the Southern Newspaper Publishers Association, presented a plaque to the company to commend the construction of the first independent-financed newsprint mill in the south. Anderson credited the company with "vision and initiative" in selecting a southern site.

The mill's significance to the U. S. as an additional source of newsprint is reflected in the fact its entire output for the next 15 years has been sold to publishers of newspapers in 128 cities in 14 southern states. More than 80 per cent of newsprint consumed by U. S. newspapers is imported from Canadian mills.

For many years, Bowaters has supplied newsprint to American newspapers, particularly in the south, from its Cornerbrook mills in Newfoundland. Officially, Cornerbrook's shipments to the United States will not be decreased as a result of the Tennessee mill. The additional capacity has permitted the company more than to double the number of its customers in the United States.

The Bowaters empire consists of the parent holding company and 40 subsidiaries in 128 cities in 14 southern states, Australia, South Africa, Sweden, Norway and the United States.

The Calhoun plant went into production in the middle of July. An unusual feature is its gigantic wood storage pond, the first ever built. The 500-foot pond was developed by the company to eliminate wood deterioration, a hazard common to southern mill operations where logs are stored in the open. It can hold 30,000 cords of wood, enough to keep the plant running for six weeks.

The mill's two paper-making machines are capable of turning out a sheet of newsprint nearly 20 feet wide at a rate of 2,000 feet a minute.

Each machine, a suction pick-up roll, the first ever to be included in the original design of a newsprint machine, assists the web of moist pulp on its way to the drier section. This latest development in paper-making technique allows greater production speed and improves the efficiency of the newsprint manufacturing process.
