In Scotland, according to the Edinburgh Scotsman, the two per cent, hitherto allowed on deposits by the banks is to be at once reduced to 1 1/2 per cent.

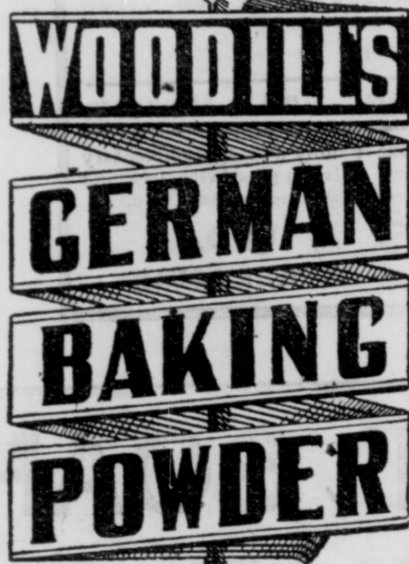

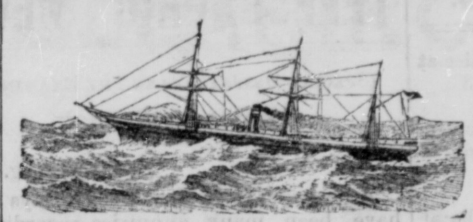

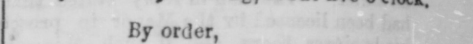
