Appeal cases heard in Georgetown Court

GEORGETOWN - Appeal cases were heard here Tuesday at a special sitting of the Supreme Court. Mr. Justice Mark E. McGuigan presided.

The first case was The Queen, respondent, vs. Emerson Gormley of Murray River, appellant. It was an appeal from a conviction by Magistrate James B. Johnston on a charge of selling liquor contrary to the Liquor Control Act. When arraigned Gormley, not represented by counsel, pleaded guilty and the case was dismissed. Costs were assessed at \$20.

In the second case, The Queen, respondent, vs. Lawrence Wallace MacLeod, Murray River, appellant, was adjourned to the next sitting of the court, May 2, 1967, without evidence being heard.

Crown witnesses were out of the province. The case is an appeal from a conviction by Magistrate Johnston in a liquor selling charge.

In the third case, The Queen, respondent vs. Mrs. Jennie Spencer Acorn of Abney, also on a liquor selling charge, the appeal was abandoned by counsel for the appellant, Frank Sigworth. The conviction was confirmed. Costs were placed at \$20.

G. Gordon Tweedy, Kings County crown prosecutor, represented the crown in all cases. The court adjourned until tomorrow.

Former Islander Honored By Ottawa Journal

The Ottawa Journal last Saturday, November 19, honored a native Charlottetown man, retired Group Captain Hugh Ronald Stewart, by publishing an extended biography of him, in its "Faces of Ottawa" series.

Group Captain Stewart has been a resident of his adopted city, the national capital, for the past 30 years, although he vacations on the Island every summer.

Son of David B. Stewart, of the Mount Stewart family and of Dorothy Pope, daughter of W.H. Pope, one of the Fathers of Confederation; Ronny Stewart was born in Charlottetown on April 30, 1896. He enlisted in August, 1914, in the 1st Canadian Division Signals, with a local group that included E.G. Weeks, later a Major-General; and Harry Whitlock, now of Windsor, Ont.

Ronny Stewart served 30 months at the front, in France

and Belgium, and was in the Second Battle of Ypres before transferring to the Royal Flying Corps, as an observer in 1916. Back in Charlottetown, he was from 1942 to 1935 deputy provincial secretary-treasurer, and clerk of the executive council.

Moving to Ottawa, he was deputy assistant secretary to two successive Governors-General, Lord Besborough and Lord Tweedsmuir.

In 1939 he re-entered the air force as personal assistant to the chief of the air staff, served as air secretary to the minister for air, and again as director of air intelligence, in the rank of group captain. After the war, Ronny Stewart served veterans affairs at Ottawa until his retirement.

Ronny Stewart's distinguished Legion career began here in

1920 as branch secretary of the GWVA. He was later a national director of the Legionary management, and became Legion national treasurer in 1949, a post he still holds.

Mrs. Stewart is the former Mary Elaine Woodman of Alberton, P.E.I. They have three children. Janet works with the Bank of Canada in Ottawa, Thomas is an Ottawa physician, and David is with the RCMP.
