

—Mr. Edward Porritt, an English journalist, who has published some important works on parliamentary government, has an article in this month's North American Review on "The Canadian Plebiscite." In his opinion the Ottawa programme, of which the plebiscite formed a plank, was patterned after the Newcastle programme of the English Liberals. The Newcastle programme carried the English Liberals into power, but their failure to fulfil their pledges so disgusted the electorate that the next general election resulted in a much more decisive victory for their opponents. It remains, as the Montreal Gazette observes, to be seen whether the Ottawa programme will involve its originators in a like fate.

—Commenting upon "the Water Works Scandal," just now occupying attention in Ottawa, the Mayor of Ottawa said,—we quote the report:

"The mere fact of a man being out on a little time" and happening to have a few dollars of corporation money in his pocket, spends them for self-gratification, gives us no right to allege that he has disgraced himself. I might do the same thing myself, probably would do so under similar circumstances. A thing that can be so easily rectified is no disgrace."

If the people of Ottawa elect to the office of Mayor men holding opinions like this, they ought not to be surprised when embezzlements are reported. The citizens of Ottawa, as well as other cities, ought to be careful in their selections of men to fill their chief offices.

LAMBS SHIPPED.—The shipments by the Northumberland from Summerside yesterday included 320 sheep. The Guardian correspondent says the shipment was made by Mr Jones, and the sheep are for Liverpool.

PLACER GOLD.—A big find of placer gold is reported to have been made half way between Dease and Arthur Lakes. According to a despatch from Victoria one man took out 69 ounces in four days.

COMING THIS WAY.—According to a late Vancouver despatch, a man named Samuel Matheson, supposed to belong to P E Island, is in that city from the Klondike, where he struck it rich. He is said to be coming east to take his brother back.

ARTILLERY.—The members of No 1 Company, P E I Regt, of Canadian Artillery will meet at the drill shed Thursday evening at 8 o'clock, to receive their annual drill pay. Those having Lee-Enfield rifles are requested to return them that night.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular monthly meeting was held last evening. The reports showed the enrollment for the month of October to be 1396, an increase of 47 over the preceding month. The matter of sewerage for the schools was discussed but no action was taken.

The hatchet was evidently buried with the body, a fact which makes some people think the bones are those of an Indian. The remains were found nine feet below the level of the street and two feet below the cellar.
